ELECT NEW MARSHAL.

Joseph Huffman Chosen Head of Roseburg Force.

With Mayor Hoover absent, as predicted from the regular meeting, the city council, after many weeks of delay, quickly disposed of the city police question by electing Joseph Huffman marshal to succeed I. J. Norman, resigned. Carl Palm, who has been acting as marshal for a period dating back to the beginning of the illness of Mr. Norman which caused him to give up his star, was elected to the position of night watchman, a job that has been held by Mr. Huffman for the past ten months. The marshalship carries a salary of \$65 per month, \$5 more than that of the night shift, but the difference in pay is more than earned by the multiplicity of duties which the day-time officer is expected to perform in addition to looking after the peace of the city.—Roseburg Review.
