

ARE BOOSTING FOR COOS BAY

Portland Men Tell Why Business Men There Should Attend Meeting Here.

The Portland Journal is booming the meeting of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress which will be held on Coos Bay August 20 and 21 with a vigor that will undoubtedly assure the attendance of a large number of Rose City business men. It has been printing column articles day after day about the meeting, and is printing interviews with leading citizens on reasons why Portland should be well represented. Coos Bay people more than appreciate the interest that the Journal is showing in this section and the aid it is giving the campaign for the development of this section as well as the rest of the state. In a recent issue, it printed the following:

"William Grimes, a member of the joint executive committee of the commercial clubs of Marshfield and North Bend, which is the committee of arrangements having in charge the entertainment of visitors to the Oregon-Idaho Development congress to be held at Coos Bay, August 20, 21, has notified officers of the club and other state bodies of Portland that no matter how large the delegation of Portland visitors everybody will be well taken care of.

"The residents of Coos Bay will take into their own homes visitors to who fail to get accommodations at hotels, and no one will be permitted to go hungry or be without a place to lay his head should he feel like separating himself from the festivities long enough to bother with sleep.

"Interest in the congress is increasing. Every wholesale and jobbing and manufacturing house in Portland has been requested by the Coos Bay committee to have at least one representative, the principal stockholder preferred, present at the congress.

Wittenberg Is a Booster.

"Herman Wittenberg, vice-president of the Pacific Coast Biscuit Company, an enthusiastic booster for everything tending to the development of Oregon, interior or otherwise, said this afternoon:

"Portland can take care of itself, of course, but no growth in the interior means that Portland will not progress very rapidly. So it stands to reason that the faster the interior is filled with people, railroads, towns, manufacturing plants, the better it will be for Portland. It is the railroad that comes first, then the people, the towns, and other agents of prosperity. Portland ought to have a representative showing at the Coos Bay meeting—sure."

"S. B. Vincent, local manager for the Associated Press said: "Coos Bay is the deep seaport of Oregon and the only harbor in the United States where coal is mined and loaded almost direct from the mine's mouth into ocean going vessels.

"Coos Bay has the largest belt of standing timber tributary to any port in the entire world.

"Coos Bay is one of the three bay harbors on the Pacific shore of the United States, being midway between Seattle and San Francisco. It is farther west than either and nearer the Orient, opening to the awakening trade with Asiatic nations, while forming a gateway to the commercial zone of the United States.

"Coos Bay has a bar with a depth of 21 feet at extreme low

tide, and steamships and sailing vessels ply regularly between this point and San Francisco and Portland, and to some foreign ports. Bar and bay have a rockless bottom, and need only extension of jetty and a little dredging to direct the channel, to admit the largest sea-going vessels.

Has Many Industries.

"Coos Bay has mills, shipbuilding plants and other factories in operation and room and opportunity for scores of others. The problem of cheap fuel and material, and water transportation is here solved.

"Coos County produces the famous Coos Bay Gravenstein and other varieties of apples, and apple pests are practically unknown. Strawberries ripen until December. Blackberries, loganberries, cranberries and kindred fruits grow to perfection.

"Coos County is an ideal land—a veritable cow heaven. Grass grows green the year around. There is not a place in the United States where butter can be produced so cheaply and sold at a better price.

"Coos Bay lands offer inducements to the market gardener. Vegetables grow to prodigious size and the mines, mills and factories furnish a good home market.

"Coos Bay has a climate remarkable for equability and healthfulness. The thermometer rarely drops to within 30 or rises to 80 degrees above zero. For the sportsman there is game in the mountains, fish in the streams, rock oysters, clams and other shellfish in the bay and ocean. For the pleasure seeker there is surf bathing, yachting and innumerable points of interest. This country has no cyclones, no thunder storms; good schools, churches and good social conditions.

"It would pay every tourist in the western country to visit the Coos Bay region."

Teal Favors Crowd.

"Portland should have a strong representation at Coos Bay," said J. N. Teal, "for this city is the center of commercial activity of the state. It is looked to not only to take a passive interest in anything that tends to the development of the state and every part of it, but to lead in such movements. It can only show such interest by participating in every effort to this end. If we lose our leadership and our influence it will be only because we are indifferent.

"Indifference will breed indifference. Profitable relationships are reciprocal, and we cannot expect loyalty to Portland unless we are willing to help others. I certainly hope not only from Portland's standpoint and that of the state that a large representative body will go from here, but also from the pleasure and profit our people will get from the trip and seeing a beautiful and productive part of the state."

Two Hundred Should Go.

"I. N. Fleischer of the Fleischer-Mayer Company, thinks at least 200 Portland business men ought to agree to make the trip by boat. The steamer Breakwater with a capacity of 120 passengers, and Alliance with a capacity of 100, if their captains are informed in time that it will be worth waiting for, will pass up the regular schedule, leave Portland on the morning of Wednesday, August 18, making a daylight run down the Columbia, and reaching Coos Bay the following day. This could be made a most pleasant trip.

"It will be a great trip—no better scenery in the world—and everybody would enjoy it," said Mr. Fleischer.

"Portland business firms should not pass up this opportunity to make a good showing in the Coos Bay country."

WERE ANXIOUS FOR PERHAM TO COME

Roseburg City Officials Afraid They Would Have Trouble Over Marshfield Man's Contract.

That E. G. Perham of Marshfield, reached Roseburg just in time to relieve considerable anxiety among some of the city officials there is indicated by a warm tilt that occurred in the city council there last Monday evening. Mr. Perham left here Tuesday morning by stage for Roseburg. Concerning Monday evening's discussion, the Roseburg Review says:

Because E. G. Perham of Marshfield, has not come to Roseburg to execute his bond to secure his contract for the construction of a new bridge over Deer Creek, Councilman Cardwell displayed some anxiety as to Perham's faith.

"I have received from Mr. Perham a certificate of deposit of \$250 in a Marshfield bank as a forfeit," announced Recorder Orcutt. "He informed me some time ago by letter that he was getting all of his materials together, but that he would not begin work until the Warren Construction Company was through using the present bridge. I then notified him that the council wanted him to execute his bond in Roseburg, not in Marshfield, as he suggested, but to date I have received no further word from him."

"The first thing we know we'll have another Kelsey proposition on our hands," declared Cardwell. "This is what we get for dealing with outsiders."

On motion, Recorder Orcutt was instructed to notify Perham to come to Roseburg at once and execute a bond or forfeit his deposit check. He will have five days in which to do this if Recorder Orcutt can reach him by long distance telephone or 10 days if the notice has to be mailed to him.

GAME LAW IN CURRY COUNTY

Gold Beach Globe Roasts Game Warden From Coos County For His Action.

The Gold Beach Globe says: "A deputy state game warden from Coos county by the name of Morgan and James Lane of Port Orford, while driving down the road in their buggy, and while passing the Hallway House at Corbin, saw something hanging in a cherry tree in the yard that resembled fresh meat. They at once investigated the sack and found it to contain the front quarters of a deer's carcass.

No sooner had they made the discovery than they placed Dick Quellen under arrest for having deer meat in his possession. Dick explained to them how it came to be there, saying that a camper had brought it and hung it up in the tree. But the officious gentlemen contended that he was the guilty person, without one effort to find the camper who had killed the deer, and who undoubtedly had the hind quarters in his camp at that very moment.

Quellen was brought down to Wedderburn Wednesday and arraigned before Justice of the Peace Geo. B. Miller the following day at Bagnell's ferry. The over-zealous gentlemen failed to show wherein Quellen had anything to do with the meat being there, or wherein he had committed a crime of any kind; hence the case was dismissed.

The Globe ventures the assertion that Mr. Quellen has not killed a deer in twenty years, as he is near sighted and couldn't see to shoot one twenty yards away if he tried ever so hard, and for these khaki-garbed wisecracks to be buggy-riding around through the country at the State's expense, making trouble for our best citizens and heaping costs upon the taxpayers by their unwarranted arrests, is an outrage that should be stopped, even though they be given a free ride out of the county on a rail.
