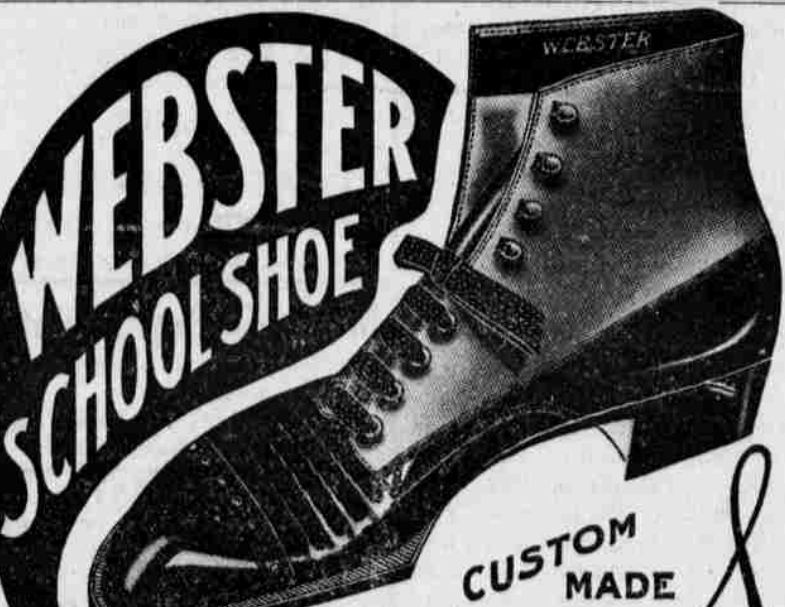

PERKINS AND MUNDY PLAN GREAT PROJECT

To Irrigate Rogue River Valley By Diverting Klamath River, at a Cost of \$1,250,000.

Concerning a new project of J. W. Perkins and Col. J. F. Mundy, who are said to be behind E. M. Andrews who proposes to drill for oil here, the Medford Tribune says:

"A new irrigation system for the Rogue River valley is being promoted by Julian W. Perkins, former owner of the Hillcrest orchard and more recently the successful promoter of Sutherlin, a fruitful valley near Roseburg. He has recently disposed of his interests in Douglas county and is turning his attention to irrigating the Rogue valley. Associated with him in the project is Colonel J. F. Mundy, of Medford.

"It is proposed to bring the waters of the Klamath river through Emigrant Gap above Ashland at an elevation that will cover all sections of the valley. The cost of the project is estimated at from \$1,250,000 to \$1,500,000.

"The project is not beyond the formative stage," said Colonel Mundy, when approached on the subject. "No survey has been made and I do not know whether the project is feasible. The government contour maps show that two long tunnels are necessary, but until a survey has been made nothing definite can be stated. The money for such a project can be secured, however, and if a survey should demonstrate the practicability of the proposition, an announcement will follow of the plans.

NEW SURVEY STARTED.

Said to Be Taking Up Old Route Along the Coast.

The Roseburg Review says: "Considerable excitement has been created by a corps of engineers starting surveys near Pistol River, Curry county. They appear to be taking up the old Southern Pacific survey near that point and continuing it south. Neither the chief engineer or any of his men would give out information. The survey was originally made for the Pacific coast extension of the Southern Pacific, from Drain by way of Coos Bay to San Francisco."

SCHOOLS GET MORE MONEY

State Fund Interest Amounts to \$308,000, Increase of Several Thousand.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 7.—State Treasurer Steel has declared the annual apportionment of the state school fund interest among the several counties of the state to amount to \$308,300.65, which is several thousand dollars in excess of that of last year and for 10 years previous. The apportionment is made upon the basis of 1,166,649 school population and a per capita of \$1.85 as against a per capita of \$1.60 last year.

Multnomah County's share of the fund is \$71,165.80, based upon a school population of 38,468; Marion comes next with a school population of 11,256, and a fund of \$20,823.60; Lane County is third with a school population of 9,793 and a fund of \$18,177.05, and Clackamas fourth with a school population of 9221 and a fund of \$17,058.85.

Every county in the state shows a growth of school population, except Baker, and it is believed some mistake must have been made in the figures from there.

A statement of the condition of the educational funds of the state July 1, 1909, made in connection with the apportionment, shows that the common school fund principal amounted to \$5,571,643.90, of which all but \$80,157.60 cash in the treasury is out on 5, 6, 7 and 8 per cent interest in first mortgage loans, school district bonds and certificates of sale of state lands. It shows cash in the bank of \$269,095.95, bearing 5 per cent interest. There is a cash balance of \$196,583.04 in the Agricultural College fund, all excepting \$1,984 out on interest, and \$104,205.36 in the university fund principal, all out on interest excepting \$4,166.72 cash on hand.

Coos county is credited with 5,427 pupils and will receive \$10,039.95 while Curry county has 635 pupils and will get \$1,174.75.
