BRIEFS OF BANDON.

News of City-By-the-Sea As Told By The Recorder.

A fine 7½-pound girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Rohn Saturday.

E. E. Oakes and Mayor Steve Gallier have received letters from the State Insurance Commission to the effect that insurance rates in Bandon will be decreased 20 per cent on condition that certain requirements in the matter of fire protection are complied with.

Frank Noel, a logger at Cody's camp was hit on the head with a loading hook Tuesday and his skull badly fractured. He was brought to town Wednesday and given medical treatment and although still unconscious will probably pull through alright unless other complications set in.

A quiet wedding was solemnized Wednesday evening, August 4th at the Presbyterian Manse, the contracting parties being Miss Linda Sutton of Port Orford and Mr. George H. Guerin of Langlois, Rev. Geo. H. Roach officiating. Both are well-known in Curry county and have the best wishes of their many friends.

After lying dormant for several months the Bandon Shingle Mill is again in operation and gives promise of running continually from now on as there seems to be a growing demand for white cedar as well as red cedar shingles at present. W. H. Dopp, who is an experienced man at the business now has charge of the mill and will keep it going at full capacity.

APPROVES THE PLAN.

Residents of Middle Fork Road Urged to Improve It.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise, says: "At a meeting of the Young Men's Commercial club at Marshfield on a recent date J. D. Goss, in an argument for the improvement of the Coos Bay wagon road stated that residents along that road are taxing themselves ten mills annually and expending at the rate of about \$21,000 a year to improve their road, "while the residents along the Myrtle Point road are not spending a cent, or at any rate only a few hundred dollars a year for the entire distance." This criticism is largely deserved. The people on the Coos county end of the Myrtle Point road have not done as much as they should toward making a good all the year around highway of the road. It is true that nature has done a great deal more for the Myrtle Point route than for the Coos Bay road, but there is still a part for the people to perform. Douglas county has said that their end of the road would be improved and it is now up to the people living up the Middle Fork to appropriate generous sums toward the permanent improvement of the highway. A generous tax should be voted each year until the road is permanently fixed for its entire length so that automobiles may travel over it all the year around. A better investment cannot be made. The entire Coquille Valley and all of Curry will undoubtedly help by private donation and it can be made a main thoroughfare between the three counties whether the Coos Bay wagon road is improved or not. At the same meeting at which Mr. Goss spoke, there were several gentlemen to speak in favor of the Myrtle Point road.

BLAME COOS BAY BOOZE.

Gold Beach Boys Get Into Trouble On the Fish.

The Gold Beach Globe says: "The peaceful slumbers of our little berg was abruptly disturbed last night when the old man Anderson of the Union Fisheries, found five of the boys who are employed across the river, aboard the Fish. Although no harm to the boat was intended by the boys, Mr. Anderson thought there was and likewise placed them under arrest at the point of a rifle and marched them up town. Judge Bailey, Sheriff Tyler and Justice of the peace Kreuger were all summoned. On investigation it was learned that Engineer Baars had brought from Marshfield a bottle of booze for some of the boys, and had given them permission to go aboard the Fish and get it. After Mr. Anderson learned the cause of their visit he dismissed the case, with a warning for them not to be caught under such circumstances again."

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

News of Upper Coquille Valley As Told By The Enterprise.

Mrs. Frank Ray and Grandma Ray are over from Marshfield visiting at the home of W. Lee Ray.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Snell at Covina, Cal., on July 30. Mrs. Snell's mother, Mrs. Anne Barklow, is visiting her.

Mrs. E. Arneson has been very sick at her home northeast of town this week. She has had several severe hemorrhages of the lungs and her family has been concerned for her health.

The carpenters completed their work on W. O. Cooper's new home last week, and this week it is in the hands of the paperhangers and painters for the finishing touches. Mr. Cooper has a commodious and convenient home and one that is excellent in every detail.

Mrs. Della M. Stevenson, daughter of P. Wise of this city, died at her home at Eugene on Sunday July 11. Mrs. Stevenson was born and raised in Myrtle Point and has many friends here who will be sorry to learn of her death. Besides her husband, she is survived by a daughter 13 years of age.

Postmaster H. B. Steward has not only demonstrated that strawberry culture is profitable on the uplands of Myrtle Point but is also proving that peaches and other fruit may be grown thereon. He planted several peach trees in his orchard and this year they produced some fine fruit, nicely colored and flavored.

Not as many deer carcasses are being brought to town as has been usual at the opening of the deer season, which would lead to the belief that deer are not as plentiful as formerly. Hunters who have been out state that game is difficult to locate and not at all plentiful. Doe and fawn are sometimes seen but they are protected by law, and no one cares to shoot them.

A window in the Lewellen furniture store was broken last Sunday in a manner that is probably all alone in its originality. A half link of a chain that was lying in the road was stepped upon by a passing horse in such a manner that it was hurled against the window with sufficient force to break a small hole and crack the glass in two directions. W. E. Lewellen was standing near when the accident happened.

Rev. A. H. Cissna, who had charge of the United Brethren services that closed at Gravel Ford Sunday, reports a very successful series of meetings, having had 26 conversions and 20 accessions to the church. There was a good attendance at all of the services, and the best of order prevailed. At the close of the meeting the pastor was presented with a new cook stove and Rev. R. Sumerlin who assisted him, with a purse of \$10.60.

W. H. Widby has a start in strawberries that seem to be most successful late producers, and they have been gathering from twenty to thirty boxes about twice a week from a small patch. The fruit is large and luscious and finds a ready sale. A box was brought in to this office that contained but fifteen berries, but was heaping full. Seven of the berries, laid side by side and touching, occupied a space a foot in length. The plants came from stock started here by Grandpa Lewellen a number of years ago.

A. Smalley reports that the people living in his section, near Arago, are quite indignant at the action of certain hunters, who, they charge, come from Myrtle Point. These men come in without permission, in season and out and shoot deer, usually on Sunday. A week ago they shot two fine buck deer, and left the carcasses on the ground to rot, taking only the hams. Lying nearby was the carcass of a fine Jersey heifer that they had shot. It belonged to L. Aasen and no offer was made in settlement of the loss. A year ago a two-year-old steer was killed for Mr. Smalley.
