SINGER PAID WELL.

Noted Swedish Vocalist Receives \$2,500 In Seattle.

SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—Three hundred and fifty-nine dollars each for the seven songs which she sang in the Swedish Day concert, is the price that was paid to Mme. Hellstrom-Oscar, the famous prima donna from the Royal Opera at Stockholm, for her one appearance at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition.

"I heard of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition even as far away as Sweden," said Mme. Oscar, when interviewed in her suite at the Hotel Nelson.

"I confess that the whole development of this country surprised me as I had an idea that the Pacific Coast was a wild unsettled region." And the exposition, I regard as the most beautiful that I have ever attended. It is not so large as some of the others but the mountains and the lakes remind me of the scenery away back in Sweden."

For her appearance at the Exposition, Mme. Oscar is paid \$2,500, an amount greater than Jenny Lind, the Swedish nightingale of past years ever received. Like Christine Nelson and Jenny Lind, Mme. Hellstrom-Oscar comes from Swedish peasant stock, and her earliest surroundings were of the humblest kind.

WAITED 40 YEARS TO WED.

Fires of Love Burned Until Each Was Widowed.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Aug. 7.—After waiting forty years for circumstances to make the culmination of his romance honorable, George Edwards, aged 74, was married to Mrs. Mary E. Ramsey, aged 68.

Oddly enough, each of the elderly bridal pair had lived half a century as the head of a happy household, though each felt the inextinguishable fires of love for another beyond the forbidden lines. Two or three years ago, after each had celebrated a golden wedding, death entered each household. Respect for the home kept the aged lovers apart for two more years.

BECOMES DEAF, DUMB AND BLIND IN ICE BOX

Connecticut Boy, Overheated By Ball Game, Eats Cream, Drinks Soda and Collapses.

WATERBURY, Conn., Aug. 7.—After playing ball three hours the other day and becoming overheated, Joseph Cormier of Somersville went to a drug store and ate two dishes of ice cream, drinking cold soda with it.

Being employed in the store, he commenced to pack ice in an ice box and became so chilled by the sudden atmospheric change that he was stricken deaf, dumb and blind. Physicians say this was caused by a clogging of the blood.

After lying in a comatose condition, while physicians worked over him for twenty-four hours, the youth regained his sight and hearing but not his speech. His right side is paralyzed, and physicians say he will be partly paralyzed for life if he recovers. The case is a rare one, the physicians say.

TERMS

Nuts, in original sacks, cheese, butter, eggs, green fruit and vegetables, produce, flour, feed, salt, cottonseed, rice, canned meats, sulphur, bluestone and pick-ups (goods not carried in stock by us), net cash 15 days.

Packing house products (meats and lard), less 1/2c per pound if paid in 15 days.

All sugars, except maple and lemon, less 1/2c per pound for cash 15 days, prompt.

Teas, bulk roast coffees, spices and extracts, 90 days net or 3 per cent for cash in 10 days.

Cigars, 60 days net, or 30 days less 3 per cent in lots of 500 or over; less quantities, 2 per cent.

On general groceries, except as noted, 2 per cent discount allowed for cash in 10 days.

Now just figure for yourself 2 per cent in ten days means three times in thirty or 6 per cent and in 365 days or one year 73 per cent. When you get credit you are not getting any favors as after the first thirty days it comes to be the same as cash but you do not get the discounts.
