APPROXIMATELY 200,000 automobiles have been ordered by dealers in the United States for next season. The average retail cost will be \$1,000 per machine. This will make a total of \$200,000,000 expended in this country in a single year for cars.

BAN ON AMERICAN COINS.

WITHIN A FEW months there is likely to be a decided increase in the visible supply of small change in the United States, for the finance department of Canada has taken steps to bar American silver coins from circulating in that country. Incidentally the fact is disclosed that throughout the dominion American coins form fully forty per cent of the total silver circulation. In the western provinces at least one-half of the coins are American.

Sentimental as well as business reasons are given for this action on the part of the Canadian government. With the American coins out of the way it will be necessary to substitute Canadian coins, and the seigniorage, which is the profit received by the government on bullion brought to the mint to be coined, will amount to considerable.

As for the American coins, from the dime to the dollar, all will be welcomed home again. We need them in our business.
