NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given, by order of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, dated the 24th day of June, 1909, that a special election will be held at the City Hall in the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m., and 6 o'clock p. m., on **TUESDAY** the 24th day of August, 1909, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said City for their approval or rejection, an amendment to Section 110 of the City Charter of said City of Marshfield, to increase the limit of indebtedness to five per cent of the assessed valuation of the property within the corporate limits of the said city, and also an amendment to sub-division 34 of Section 28 of the Charter of the said City of Marshfield, authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, to issue and dispose of bonds of said city, not exceeding five per cent of the assessed valuation of the property within the corporate limits of said City of Marshfield, said bonds to be payable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years, the same to bear interest not exceeding six per cent, for the purpose of redeeming and paying off the warrant indebtedness of the said City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

News of Upper Coquille Valley As Told By The Enterprise.

Prof. Shepman, of North Powder, Ore., has been engaged as principal of the Myrtle Point school for the coming year. Prof. Shepman comes highly recommended.

Wm. Page and Marshal Macklin, formerly residents of this place, but who have lately resided in Klamath county, have returned to Coos and are located at Bandon.

Geo. Rackieff will leave tomorrow for Silverdale, Wash., to join his wife who is visiting her parents there. He expects to locate somewhere in Washington.

Wayne Endicott, the seven-year-old son of R. C. Endicott of Bridge, while playing with a small hunting ax Sunday cut his left hand quite severely, the third finger being severed from the hand.

Rev. and Mrs. Branham expect to leave for Los Angeles next week where they will locate. During Rev. Branham's two years pastorate here of the Methodist Episcopal church, south they have made many friends and who will regret their leaving. The change is made in the hope of benefiting Mrs. Branham's health.

News of City-by-the-Sea As Told By The Recorder.

Theodore Hillyer and wife of Marshfield, are in Bandon this week.

Henry E. Sanford was born in New York March 21, 1833, and died in Bandon, Ore., August 9, aged 76 years, 4 months and 18 days.

The line of survey for the Bandon Port Orford railroad is about complete now and the work of securing the right of way is proceeding rapidly and is practically all secured between Bandon and Two Mile. Actual construction work will begin about September 15.

The fire alarm was turned in Monday morning, the fire being at the Bandon Shingle Mill. The fire department made a run for the scene, but the shingle mill force had extinguished the flames with their own hose, which was attached to the city water plug, before the department arrived. There was no damage.
