BUILD FINE ROAD IN CURRY COUNTY

Sixteen Miles of Gravel Highway Being Put In Between Langlois and Port Orford.

Sixteen miles of the best gravel road that has been built in this section is being built between Langlois and Port Orford. F. S. Dow, who returned from a trip to that section today, said that the improvement was one of the best pieces of road building he has seen in this section. About twenty teams are employed, the work being rushed so that it will be completed before the rainy season. Heretofore the road there during the winter months has been bad, making it difficult for the ranchers to market their products.

FOUND DEAD; SAY SUICIDE

having gone home and not been apprised of the discovery until later.

Chas. O. E. Erickson testified that he had talked with Art Johnson about 8 o'clock and that he appeared all right.

Dr. Golden said he had been notified by Tom Coke about 10:30 last night that Art Johnson had been found dead in West Marshfield. He proceeded there at once and found Tom Hall and others trying to restore life. He said that he had found a revolver with one empty cartridge near the body. He had the body removed to the morgue searching the clothing for the watch was missing. He said the broken chain indicated that the watch had been jerked off as though by a robber or in working. Later he and Chas. Stauff went out to where the body was found in hopes of finding the watch but that the search had been futile.

Jas. O. Johnson testified that he was a brother of the dead man and identified the revolver found near the body as belonging to him. He said that he had left the revolver at his brother's home three months ago and a few days ago noticed that it had disappeared from the peg near the stove where he had hung it. He didn't know his brother was carrying it. He said he had stopped two nights this week at his brother's home. So far as he knew, his brother had no worry and was not despondent.

J. D. Johnson, father of the dead man testified that his son had told him of two attempts to hold him up. The first one occurred several months ago and he had driven off the holdup man with an umbrella. The second had happened only a few weeks ago near the place where the body was found. He said that his son had told him that a man had jumped out at him and had chased him quite away and later had dodged off into the brush. He said that the watch in question had been given by him to his son and was a gold filled case with \$10 works. He didn't know whether his son carried any money last night or not. He didn't know he was carrying a gun but said that the son had told him after the second attempted holdup that he would have to "fix for them."

Dr. Golden said that fifteen cents was all the money found in the dead man's pockets.

Dr. E. E. Straw, who performed the autopsy testified that he had been called out about 10 o'clock to view a dead man found on the bridge. When he got there, he recognized the body as that of Art Johnson. He said that the wrist was pulseless and he thought he had dropped dead from heart failure, Dr. Mingus having told him that a weak heart had caused them trouble when they operated on Johnson for appendicitis. Dr. Straw said that the autopsy showed death was due to a bullet wound in the heart. The bullet had penetrated the upper right side of the heart and from its course must have been fired with the gun barrel at right angles to the body. He said that the wound would stop breathing almost instantly, the victim possibly gasping a few times. He said that the shot had been fired with the muzzle of a gun within about eight inches of the body, probably.

Was 32 Years Old.

Rector A. Johnson was thirty-two years old. He had resided in Marshfield about twenty-two years. He is survived by a wife, formerly Miss Myrtle Abbott, daughter of Trainmaster Abbott of the local railway, and a two-year-old child.

He was a member of the Marshfield fire department, of the Woodmen of the World, the Redmen and the Fraternal Union. He carried \$2,000 insurance in the Woodmen of the World and \$1,200 in the Fraternal Union.

His father, mother and three brothers and two sisters also survive him. He resided on West Commercial avenue near the top of the hill.

Last evening, Johnson played with his little child for quite a while before coming down town. Mrs. Johnson has been in poor health for some time and the shock was a severe one to her.
