Driving Piling.—W. H. Noble this afternoon will begin driving piling for the foundation of the new three-story brick block which W. S. Chandler will erect at the northeast corner of Central avenue and Second street.

Start Paving Work.—Contractors Whitmore and Morrissey today began preliminary work on their bituminous paving contract. Hugh McLain has the South Marshfield sewage system progressing nicely and about all the common laborers that can be found are being put to work.

Met Saturday.—A meeting of the directors of the Coos Bay and Boise Railway was held Saturday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce. No important action was taken, aside from the reports being gone over. Affairs are in a very satisfactory condition and good progress is being made on the survey.
