

PRAISES NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Prof. E. D. Ressler of Oregon State Agricultural College, Visits It.

Professor E. D. Ressler of Corvallis, who has been in the city the past two days in the interest of the Oregon Agricultural College, left Saturday for Bandon. He will be in Myrtle Point today and in Coquille Tuesday, in attendance on the annual teachers' institute. It was just seven years ago that he made his first trip to Coos county for the Oregon State Normal School at Monmouth and by a coincidence his first trip for the O. A. C. is also to Coos.

Professor Ressler is just entering upon his duties as head of the department of Industrial pedagogy, a new chair established by the Oregon Agricultural College. Among his duties will be the promotion of industrial education in the public schools of the state, the preparation of bulletins for the guidance of teachers and the use of pupils, and the training of teachers for the different branches. He was much interested in an inspection of Marshfield's magnificent new high school building, which in a number of respects he considers the best equipped in the state. Marshfield will be a pioneer in the introduction of the industrial idea into its schools.

The establishment of this new department at the Corvallis School also puts Oregon in the forefront of states making provision for the "new education." Educators have recognized for years that the course of study in the elementary and high schools has been constructed and administered with the idea that all children would enter institutions of higher education after completion of the common school course. As a matter of fact, less than ten per cent of the children who finish the elementary school enter the high school, and less than five per cent go to the higher institutions.

The new education recognizes the greater obligation of the schools to the vast majority of the boys and girls who will never receive any other school advantages. Industrial training means not only the introduction of manual training, domestic science and agriculture into the course, but the reconstruction of the method and material of such branches as geography, history, arithmetic and language, with a view to their practical application to the life of the present. In other words, the schools must prepare their pupils for practical efficiency in the ordinary vocations of life, in which the vast majority must earn their living.

This new education need not and must not interfere with the encouragement of the few who will avail themselves of the higher education. In fact, the effect will be to so interest the boys and girls that they will remain longer in school and therefore be encouraged and stimulated to increased preparation for life's duties.

Professor Ressler reports all prospects bright for an increased attendance the coming year at the Oregon Agricultural College.

Last year's enrollment passed the thirteen hundred mark and this year will see over fifteen hundred students in attendance. Quite a number of students from Coos county are enrolled and many others are planning to enter next year.

MEREEN TEAM BEAT POWERS

"Boss Logger" Goes Down to Defeat Before Mill Superintendent.

By a score of nine to six, Arno Mereen's team yesterday afternoon took the second game from A. H. Powers' aggregation at the beach before an audience of fans whose vociferous enthusiasm made the Sand Hills ring. The first game resulted in a victory for Mr. Powers' team so that a third will have to be played to determine the championship.

Superintendent Mereen had a couple of cards up his sleeves for yesterday's game and A. H. Powers almost thwarted his designs and would have succeeded had it not been for the loyalty and fealty that a couple of the players showed to Mr. Mereen. The latter had selected a battery that is said to be the goods and sent the Mabel H up to bring them down lest Mr. Powers get hold of them on the trip to the beach. However, according to the Smith-Powers baseball rules for the season of 1909, the captains have to pick their teams on the field. A bat was tossed up and Powers won first choice. He had been given a tip and he selected Mr. Mereen's star pitcher. Mr. Powers also got one or two more of Mr. Mereen's stars in the shuffle.

C. A. Smith was present and was to umpire but the feeling between Messrs. Powers and Mereen ran so high after the controversy entailed by the selection of the two teams that they insisted that the umpire take an oath to make all decisions without fear or favor. Mr. Smith felt this was a little too much and so J. E. Oren and Prentiss N. Gray had to be substituted. The former had a gun and the latter a baseball bat to see that all decisions were promptly enforced.

With Powers getting Mereen's star twirler, the betting odds were in favor of his aggregation but mysteriously the star's arm went to the bad. Mr. Powers was still determined to win and landed a fine two bagger but when he got to second, someone had stolen the base and instead of giving him a stolen base, Umpire Oren insisted he was out, bringing down his base-running average, according to statistics compiled by official scorer, Geo. F. Murch, superintendent of the Smith mill. Mr. Mereen was not going to let Captain Powers outwit him and he swatted away with all his might. He clipped it off to first at a pace that made the 100-yard dash in 9 2-5 seconds, made by Robert Hopwood, who is visiting here with Carrol and Vernon Smith, and which is the world's collegiate record, look like thirty cents. However he lost his rudder when he reached first and instead of steering for second, he landed in the pitcher's box breathless and was called out.
