Back On Plant.—Martin Gallagher formerly steward on the M. F. Plant, but who has been on other vessels for some time, has resumed his old position and was warmly greeted by many old time friends today.

Sells Interest.—G. W. Carleton has disposed of his interest in the Archer Tract, on Isthmus Inlet across from the C. A. Smith mill, to a large lumber company. Whether this means that another mill or factory will be built there is not announced.
