Plans New Ferry.—Alex Simpson of Haynes Inlet is advocating a new ferry between North Bend and Glasgow from where a good road could be fixed up to Ten Mile. This would enable parties from the Bay to make the trip direct to Ten Mile with team or auto.

Zugg, who has been instructor in history and economics at Albany college for several years, has been appointed pastor of the Marshfield Presbyterian church and will arrive here on the Breakwater to assume his new charge. Rev. Zugg comes highly recommended, being especially

ly chosen for the Marshfield parish which has been vacant for more than a year.

Buy In Douglas.—C. C. Beale and wife of Coos county, were in Canyonville the latter part of last week, and negotiated for the Easley place south of town. No money changed hands, but the deal is considered practically closed. They expect to return in a few days and complete it. — Roseburg Review.

Mr. Oren will leave in about two weeks to join them. As yet, no successor to him as general manager of the C. A. Smith mill has been chosen.

Apple Crop Short.—A meeting of the Coos Bay Fruit Growers Association was held at the Chamber of Commerce this morning. Growers present reported that the yield this year would not be more than fifty per cent but that the quality would be good. The Coquille association has agreed to go in with them in buying boxes and arranging for the sale of the fruit. An expert packer will be brought here. The association has nearly closed with a commission house for the sale of the crop.

HOT TILT AT DENVER.

Sec. Wilson and G. O. Emery in Bitter Debate.

DENVER, Aug. 24.—A bitter tilt over the merits of the poison referee board appointed at the instance of President Roosevelt to investigate the use of benzoate of soda as a preservative, took place between Secretary of Agriculture James J. Wilson, and G. O. Emery of Madison, Wis., before the Convention of Pure Food men. Emery had attacked the finding of the Board that benzoate of soda is not harmful and pointed to Wilson as having blocked the investigation of the subject. Language that bordered on the acrimonious was used by both parties. The discussion was stopped in its midst by a motion to adjourn.

ROSEBURG HAS 5323.

So Directory Compiler Estimates Population There.

The Roseburg Review says: "A gain of almost 215 per cent in population in the past nine years is the record made by this city, according to the footings completed by Fred S. Bynon, publisher of Roseburg's new city directory, which is now in the hands of the printer. The U. S. census for the year 1900 gave Roseburg a population of 1,690 persons. Mr. Bynon's present figures show a population of 5,323, or considerably more than three times the number of nine years ago. Of course, the city boundaries have been materially extended during that period, yet this shows an astonishing increase."
