

COOS COUNTY CASE HEARD

MRS. MARY HOUGHTON'S HOME-STEAD MAY BE WRESTED FROM HER FOR NOT WORKING IT SUFFICIENTLY.

The Roseburg News says: "Another case is up before the land office in this city similar to the one pending decision from Myrtle Creek. It is that of the United States vs. Mary Nordburg, formerly Mary Houghton. It involves lot 4, section 6, twp. 32 S., range 14 W., lots 3 and 4, section 6, twp. 33 S., range 14 W., N. E. 1/4 N. W. 1/4 section 7, twp. 33 S., range 14 W. and is the homestead entry of Mary Houghton of Coos county.

"The charges brought against Mary Houghton are that she did not reside upon and cultivate the land; that the entry was not made in good faith, but for the purpose of obtaining the timber on the land, and they are brought by the 'Forestry office in its zeal to make a record.'

"The actual record shows that the woman bought the improvements on the land in question and paid \$500 for them. They also show that about July 15, 1902, she established a residence on the land and resided continuously thereon from the date of her settlement until she made proof of her five years residence in 1907. They show further that her proof was found regular and satisfactory, and final certificate and receipt issued to entitle her to a patent, and delivered from the land office of this city.

"There is absolutely nothing in the case of the prosecution, though it charges the woman with fraud, to show that she has acted otherwise than in good faith and the residence question being answered there is left but the charge of taking up the land for the timber there is on it. This is nonsensical from the fact that there is, according to the prosecution and one forest ranger, but one million feet of timber on the land. The facts are had she desired timber she could have gone into Curry county and bought 4,000,000 feet at less than the homestead cost her when she made her homestead entry.

"But the cat was let out of the bag when the forest ranger came to testify that the forest service wanted the woman's place for a ranger station, and it seems to be the intention of some one to have it for that purpose, it matters not the cost or the damage done an honest woman's reputation or the hardships it works to her suffering."
