NORWAY DAY AT THE FAIR

OLD VIKING KING SHIP WILL BE FEATURE OF SEATTLE PROGRAM ON AUGUST 30TH.

SEATTLE, Aug. 28.—On August 30th, Norway Day will be celebrated at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition by the most gorgeous display of pagantry of the Norse Viking Era, that has ever been attempted in America.

The program for the day has now been completed, and every minute of the time will present some interesting spectacular event. The Viking ship designed from the vessel taken from the Kings Mound in Gokstad has been reconstructed and launched; it will be rowed to the Exposition grounds by a crew of oarsmen, and will bear a king who will wed a queen to be picked by popular votes through the northwest.

Previous to making the landing, the ship will be maneuvered in Lake Washington and a demonstration of the sea craft of the old vikings will be made. The costuming of each individual taking part in the spectacle will be absolutely true, and many of the suits of old chain and plate armor have seen service during the historical periods represented. The pageant will be divided into nine periods representing each important step in Norse history from the fifth century to the present day invasion of Alaska by the Vikings of the men of the Fifth century.

Music will enter largely into the festivities of the day, and in addition to five bands from outside cities, the famous St. Olaf College Band and the Exposition musical organization will take part in the pageant and entertainments.
