Kills Deer.—This morning Fred McCormac and F. M. Friedberg killed a two point buck in the rear of A. P. Owen's summer cottage on South Coos River. The buck came down from the hills and was within 100 feet of the McCormac summer home when he was killed.

Had Ptomaine Poisoning.—Hester Elizabeth Skinner, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Skinner, had a slight attack of ptomaine poisoning yesterday but being promptly attended was out of danger in a few hours. Her recovery will be gratifying news to "Miss Betty's" many friends.

No Game Sunday.—The Marshfield and Coquille baseball teams have been disbanded and the game planned for tomorrow at Coquille has been called off. Harry Gardiner, the Coquille star pitcher, and his wife passed through here today en route to Portland where they will remain.

Missed Father.—Owing to Capt. Peters of the dredge Oregon, having been unexpectedly summoned to Portland early in the week, he failed to meet his three children who came down on the Breakwater to surprise him here. Donald M. Charleston wired him at Portland of their arrival and he had them return to Portland on the Breakwater this morning.

Miss Lyons Resigns.—Miss Nannie Lyons, who has been instructor in the eighth grade of the Marshfield public schools for the past few years has resigned. She has been attending summer school at Eugene and has written Judge Hall, secretary of the school board that she received

the offer of a much better position and would accept it. She did not state where it was.

Fire at Head Coos River.—Fire is raging in the forest timber in section 5, township 27, range 7 west, at the extreme head of Coos River, in Douglas county, threatening to destroy everything in its vicinity. Dig Two Manholes.—Owing to a misunderstanding of location of the front street sewer, Hugh McLain who had the contract to put in a manhole at the corner of Front and Commercial streets had to dig two holes. When he got down a little ways on the second hole, he found that the old manhole there had been covered up when the paving was put in a year ago. The cutting through the bituminous rock paving demonstrated it was in good condition and that the concrete under it was in unusual fine shape. The concrete was made of crushed stone and its condition would indicate that it made even better concrete than imported gravel does.

LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"Here is the first picture that S. B. Cathcart has had taken in forty years," remarked A. H. Powers this week as he exhibited a snap-shot view in 40 Years. of the former county surveyor." I caught him the other day and got a pretty good one of him and will present him one." The picture is really a good one of Mr. Cathcart and a party of friends, demonstrating that Mr. Powers has added another accomplishment to his versatile ability.

"I came to Coos Bay in 1854 and so far as I know there are only three people living here now who preceded me into this county," remarked A. G. Residents Alken, the well-known Marshfield pioneer the other day. "They are Mrs. Esther Lockhart, who came here in 1853, and B. F. Ross who came here the same year. The last few years have been marked by the death of many of the early residents. While to me it doesn't seem so very long since I first saw Coos Bay, still when I stop and think of what has transpired and the changes that have been made here, I begin to realize how rapidly the time has passed."

"While at Seattle, I had one of the most enjoyable experiences of years," remarked W. P. Murphy who has just returned from the Exposition. "It was a meeting with Art Bennett of Rochester, N. Y., under whom I had learned my trade and whom I had not met for twenty-four years. He and his wife came out to the Seattle Fair and intended to come to Coos Bay to see me but they accidentally learned that we were coming to Seattle and finally got in touch with Frank Smith at the Hatcheries Exhibit. He didn't tell Mr. Smith who he was, merely saying he wished to meet me. Soon after we got there, we went to the Hatchery building. Mrs. Murphy noticed someone watching me closely and told me I had better keep my eye on him. I didn't pay much attention but pretty soon the party in question walked over near us and asked some question. The minute I heard his voice, I recognized him as Art Bennett and if two people were more elated over meeting each other, I don't know of it. We visited for two solid days, talking over old times. I think I convinced him that Coos Bay was the place for him and I rather expect to see him come here next spring to locate."
