CURRY COUNTY NEWS.

Events at Gold Beach and Vicinity Told By The Globe.

Mrs. Lydia Carey was granted a decree of divorce from Asa B. Carey. Mrs. Eliza Grimes was granted a divorce from Rella Grimes; Fred B. Postal was granted a divorce from Pearl Postal.

The Grand Jury brought in two indictments, one which is not yet made public and the other one was N. C. Nielson for allowing minors to play billiards and pool in his place of business. The defendant made a plea of guilty and was fined twenty-five dollars and costs.

Judge Coke made the announcement publicly that, owing to the fact that we only have one term of Circuit Court in a year, he would be willing to hold an adjourned session in about six months, if the citizens and taxpayers of the county deemed it advisable. It would be well for the people to talk this question over and advise the judge in the premises.

TOADS WORTH MONEY.

Iowa Man Discovers They Have Commercial Value.

FAIRFIELD, Ia., Aug. 28.—Finding in bufolentiginosus, or, as it is known to the small boy, hop toad, a willing assistant of the gardener, W. H. Pence, a contracting machinist of this city, is endeavoring to put the repulsive little animal's natural tendencies to real economic value and has advertised for toads in a local paper, desiring to stock his garden and premises with jumpers. The remarkable advertisement created considerable comment when it first appeared.

Mr. Pence is in earnest in his effort to stock his place with toads. "I've done it before," he said, "and it works to perfection. The little fellows are sure death on insects and worms and will keep a place clean. Annoying flies disappear like magic when the toads are around, and if more people made use of toads there would be fewer reports of the vegetables ruined by bugs and worms and less complaint about tuberculosis.

"People drove the toads out and it wasn't until they disappeared that the bugs came into the gardens in such large numbers. I remember when the cabbage worms first came. We never used to have any of them. I tell you, if people would only open up their pocket books and let nature advertise a little about what she can do, they'd be wonderfully surprised. "I've used the toads before, and found them the greatest eradicator we've got."

Such a firm belief has Mr. Pence in the value of toads that he is willing to pay out good money to advertise for them and more good money to purchase them. If he secures more than enough for himself, he says, he would have no objections to going into the business of providing friends and neighbors with the hoppers. He is an ardent believer in the societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals so has a two-fold reason for wishing to stock his premises with much abused toads.

HERETIC IS MINISTER.

New York Presbyterians Accept a Unique Divine.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Rev. George Ashmore Fitch, one of three graduates of the Union Theological seminary, who in a recent examination denied the virgin birth of Christ, the historical identity of Adam and Eve, the raising of Lazarus from the dead and the resurrection of the body of the Saviour, was nevertheless ordained by the New York Presbytery by a vote of 10 to 7. He will sail for China to take up missionary work at Shanghai. The Rev. Dr. Daniel Seeley Gregory, managing editor of the Standard Dictionary and an educator of note, spoke for the opposition. "Tonight," he said, "it was a case of the Bible against the men. One or the other had to be thrown out and the presbytery of New York threw out the Bible as the infallible guide to faith and practice."

Mrs. Cecil Arneson, who has been very sick for some time, has shown no improvement in her condition recently and it is feared by her friends that she cannot long withstand the siege of sickness unless there is an early change for the better.

The team driven by Rev. C. D. Price of Bancroft became frightened at an automobile on Spruce street last Friday and ran away, smashing the rig into kindling wood. Mr. Price was compelled to secure another rig to take him home after the accident.

The burning of numerous slashings and pastures in this section of the country has filled the air with smoke and at night the hills about town are lighted with the fires. One of the biggest burnings has been the fire that went over the big rock at the Benson farm in the Catching Creek Valley.

BREAKS HIS ARM.

Coos County Pioneer Meets With Injury at Ranch.

The Bandon Recorder says: "Thos A. Lewis, pioneer of this section and a veteran of the civil war, who has been at the soldiers' home at Santa Monica, has been visiting at the Fahy home near this city for some time. Mr. Lewis had the misfortune to get his arm broken one day last week, by a board swinging around and hitting him at the Aberdeen mill. He was brought to Bandon and Dr. Houston dressed the fractured member and he is getting along as well as could be expected at present.

HAS VALUABLE COIN.

Mrs. L. A. Roberts of Myrtle Point Has \$10 Worth \$500.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "The Oregonian of the 14th contains an article of the finding of a freak 1847 gold piece and attracted by the value placed on the coin Mrs. L. A. Roberts of the city brushed up her memory and dug up some old coins which she has had in her possession for some years, and found a ten of the same date. A Portland man reading an Associated Press account of a San Francisco man who paid into the Police Court a \$10 coin which proved to be one of the six freak pieces coined in the year 1847, and valued by collectors at \$500, examined several in his own pocket and discovered its duplicate.

"The coin which Mrs. Roberts has was a gift from her father, J. R. Benson, and was valued merely as a keep-sake on account of its antiquity but it is a safe guess now that it will not be kept longer as such. The difference between the freak coins and others is that the words, "In God We Trust" are omitted. This omission was made by accident and six coins escaped into circulation before the stop order was received. The coins are now eagerly sought for by collectors."
