WOMAN'S ODD MISTAKE.

Thought Fish Tank Was For Mosquitoes.

SEATTLE, Aug. 28. — When a benevolent-looking elderly woman asked him if the small tanks in the salmon hatchery of the state fisheries exhibit in the Forestry Building of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, were not used for the extermination of the way yellow fever mosquitoes reproduce, Bernard Falter, assistant in charge of the exhibit, nearly fell into the big oyster tank.

She thought that it was an exhibit showing the development of the mosquitoes eggs, and was explaining to a companion that what were really young salmon in the stage known as the avelin were just developing wings and that in a day or so they would be able to fly.

The woman had just arrived from the Government Building where she had been inspecting the displays of the United States public health and marine medical corps, where are displayed models of houses made proof against rats for the prevention of bubonic plague and of mosquitoes for the prevention of yellow fever. The microscopic sections of the bacilli enlarge some thousands of times had impressed themselves on her mind, and their form appeared to her identical with that of the embryo salmon.

When the error was explained to the old woman, she left in considerable embarrassment, much to the delight of her younger companion to whom she had been explaining her mosquito theory.
