OIL LEASES HARD TO GET

J. W. Perkins Says Big Holdings Are Delaying Proposed Operations.

"I am leaving today for Roseburg to look after some personal business affairs there and I am very sorry that I am leaving here with oil leases closed on less than one-half the land that I had hoped to procure," said J. W. Perkins of the oil syndicate that proposes to drill for oil here. "The big land owners are holding back, making it difficult for us to proceed. We simply have to secure leases on sufficient land to protect our rights in case we strike oil."

"We are seeking leases in only three townships and want our leases to cover compact tracts of land. This is necessary because in case we strike oil, an unscrupulous or careless operator might sink a well near us and by not properly casing it, ruin the oil field for the oil section by allowing the water to get in."

"If we can secure leases on sufficient land to warrant our drilling here, we will go at it as a business proposition. We will follow absolutely the finds of Prof. Diller, the government geologist, who has investigated this field. We will sink a well 4,000 feet deep if necessary."

"A. H. Powers who left for the east this week will take our proposition up with Mr. C. A. Smith and is hopeful of closing the lease on the company's holdings, or part of them."

"The situation is simply this: If the people want to do their own speculating in oil by defraying the expense of sinking the wells, all right, but if they want us to do the speculating, we must be given a chance to win and not to merely speculate for their sole benefit."

G. E. Mickey Assigns Furniture Business to A. E. Shuster Because He Couldn't Convert Goods Into Cash.
