ROCKEFELLER HAS given some very trite advice about what men should do to succeed. But when did John D. Rockefeller become an authority upon the subject of success—of success in its real full meaning? His advice as to money making would doubtless be worth having, provided it could be shown conclusively that he was giving disinterested advice.

But as a model of the really successful man Rockefeller cannot be accepted. He has amassed millions it is true and he is a most important figure in the financial world. But his work has all been of a selfish nature, and it has all been along one line—the extending of monopolies so as to gather more gold. He has never truly served his country or his fellow men. On the contrary he has taken hundreds of millions of dollars that should have been divided among them. The worst of it all is that Rockefeller never earned his money even by conducting or establishing industries for the benefit of mankind as some wealthy men have done. He has made most of his money by financial manipulations and by extending the most hated of all monopolies, the oil trust. He and his associates are now engaged in corraling the water powers of the nation so as to further add to their wealth.

It is true Rockefeller has given much money for supposed beneficent purposes. Yet his gifts to charity have been of such a nature as to rouse resentment. He has given money to some educational institutions, but it is noted that the schools he has been most generous with smack of the donor's influence. This is something fair minded men do not like—they like to know that the fountain of learning is not contaminated.

Rockefeller's advice that a man should seek to do more than earn money sounds strange. He himself is the most conspicuous example in the world of the money seeking man. His advice that a man should not obtain wealth by "hook or by crook" seems hypocritical. If the public did not know of the past and present methods of Standard oil such advice would have more weight.

John D. Rockefeller is not really a successful man when gauged by the proper standards. His life has been a failure for it has been one of selfishness and greed. His is not the all around, well balanced character of the really successful man. That he takes but one day's vacation a year shows the fact. If he were a truly balanced man he would want more holidays and he would enjoy them.

Rockefeller is a striking example of the man who believes "money is everything." Throughout his life he has worshiped Mammon and in his egotism he doubtless believes he has succeeded well. But many men who are wiser than he, though they have not his wealth, do not envy or admire him. On the contrary they pity his state for they regard him as being much like Midas of old—surrounded with gold but unable to enjoy it.
