BANDON, the bustling, booming, hustling, humming city-by-the-sea, announces a big street carnival the last three days of this week, Sept. 23, 24 and 25. They extend a special invitation to the people of Coos Bay to come down and see them and join in the sports and festivities of the occasion. The Times has ample knowledge of the energetic and excellent manner in which this busy Coos county city accomplishes anything it attempts and therefore The Times has no hesitation in advising the most general acceptance of their hospitable invitation. EAT, DRINK AND BE MERRY.

IN A PRINTED circular distributed broadcast by them, a dozen grocery stores at Delaware, Ohio, have made a proposition to the citizens which, no doubt, will cause a good deal of reflection. "Any one," the pamphlet reads, "who drinks three glasses of whisky a day for one year and pays ten cents per glass for it, can have in exchange at any of the firms whose names appear on this card, three barrels of flour, twenty bushels of potatoes, 200 pounds of granulated sugar, one barrel of crackers, one pound of pepper, two pounds of tea, fifty pounds of salt, twenty pounds of rice, fifty pounds of butter, ten pounds of cheese, twenty-five pounds of coffee, ten pounds of candy, three dozen cans of tomatoes, ten dozen pickles, ten dozen bananas, ten dozen oranges, two dozen cans of corn, eighteen boxes of matches, half a bushel of beans, 100 cakes of soap and one package of rolled oats for the same money, and get \$15.30 premium for making the exchange in the expenditures." Being unwilling to show less enterprise than the grocers, the saloon keepers of Delaware have themselves circulated cards upon which are printed the foregoing list of commodities with the offer: "If you'll diet, eliminating the amount of food listed herewith from your bill of fare during the coming year, we will sell you for the sum thus saved 1,090 glasses of whiskey, you pouring your own drinks; also we will give you a premium of one case of beer and divers other liquors selected by yourself, up to a total value of \$13.30." Apparently the issue in Delaware is sharply defined, there being no chance for compromise. It is now up to the citizens to determine whether they will be happier living exclusively on whisky, or just food.

MARSHFIELD, OREGON

Sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned, addressed or delivered to him at his office in said City of Marshfield until 8:00 o'clock P. M., Tuesday, October 26th, 1909, for the purchase of a series of "Warrant Bonds" of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, in the sum of \$54,000.00 dollars, in denominations of one hundred to one thousand dollars to suit purchaser, dated December 1st, 1909, to run for a term of twenty (20) years at 5 per cent interest per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of June and December of each year, both principal and interest payable at banking house designated by purchaser; purchaser to furnish blank bonds and defray expense of preparation thereof; each bid to be accompanied by certified check of reputable banking house payable to the Treasurer of the City of Marshfield, in the sum of \$2,500 which shall be forfeited in case bidder fails to comply to the term of his bid; right reserved to reject any or all bids.

Population, 5,000; assessed valuation of property of city in 1908 \$1,897,544. Assessed valuation now, probably, \$2,250,000; actual valuation, probably, \$4,500,000; no other bonded indebtedness; purpose of these bonds to take up outstanding warrant indebtedness.
