ON TO THE COAST.

ACCORDING to Vice-President Stubbs, of the Southern Pacific, it is the avowed intention of the company to build the line from Drain to Coos Bay. He says it never has been the intention of the company to abandon the project after having spent so much money in securing rights-of-way, making permanent surveys and in beginning work of construction.

Now if the line from Drain to the coast is considered by the Southern Pacific to be a profitable investment, why should not a line from Eugene to the coast prove to be more so, especially in view of the fact that Drain as a centre is not to be considered for a moment alongside of Eugene. Drain is a small station with no surroundings of note to contribute to the commercial status, while Eugene today stands as the great commercial center of the upper Willamette valley territory with 50 to 100 miles in each direction from which to draw. It is the point at which upper valley trade and traffic concentrates, which makes it a commanding point from which to connect the coast for inland traffic.

Moreover, between here and the shores of the Pacific on down to Coos harbor lies as fine and extensive body of timber as lies out of doors anywhere and this alone would be one of the greatest inducements that could be offered for railroad construction to tidewater.

It will pay to build a road from Drain to Coos, it will certainly prove even more profitable to have a line to Florence from Eugene, via Elmira and from Florence on down the coast to Marshfield and the movement on foot here, promoted by local citizens should have hearty co-operation not only of Eugene citizens, but by residents all along the route with a like activity in Coos county and northward connection with the proposed Eugene line.

The time is auspicious for interesting transcontinental lines in this project for the big roads, now seeking coast connection ought to be ready and willing to join local enterprise in opening up new coast territory and reaching important coast terminals in order to corral the growing business in Western Oregon and southward, to put themselves in closest possible touch with the Panama canal, which is to be the one great developer of the Pacific coast. To make assurance doubly sure that we can build a railroad from Eugene to Florence and on down the coast, there should be a united action all along the line, not only for the purpose of arousing interest among those who would be directly benefited by construction of such a road, but for the further purpose of awakening the big railroad organizations to the importance of uniting with us in the undertaking for the mutual good that all parties concerned will derive from it.

Let us put the Eugene-Florence, and Coos Bay railroad project on a basis that will command the close attention of the railroad world and some transcontinental line, with an eye to business will join us in putting the line through.—Eugene Register.
