After a number of songs led by L. W. Traver, Chorister and reading of scripture, the history of the present chapter known as Barlett Chapter No. 17332, was given by M. D. Sumner who, with Mrs. J. W. The secretary's report gives a present membership of 55 active and associate members. A paper read by F. C. Birch on "What the League Can Do" was ably handled being given close attention.

The exercises were a complete success in every way and showed what an earnest band of young people can do when banded together.

Work for the coming year was outlined by the president and considerable work as already planned has been begun.

AGED WOMAN IS DEAD.

Mrs. Anna Henry of Oakland, Succumb.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Sept. 20.—Mrs. Anna M. Henry, probably the oldest resident of Douglas county, died at Oakland at the age of 99 years. She had been an invalid for many years past. She was a native of Switzerland, coming to this country at the age of seven years, with her parents. Her husband, to whom she was married in 1837, died in Pennsylvania in 1853. She had resided in Douglas county since 1889, dividing her time between her children at Oakland and Dillard. She leaves two sons and two daughters: Isaac Henry of Pennsylvania; John Henry and Mrs. Leah Barrett of Dillard, and Mrs. Catherine Herstine of Oakland.

Besides these there are 20 grandchildren and nine great grandchildren and six great great grandchildren.
