APPROVE DRAFT
OF FRANCHISE

City Council Passes Resolution Favoring Blake Street-Car Proposition.

The Marshfield city council last evening passed a resolution approving the J. M. Blake application for a street car franchise in Marshfield which will be passed up to the voters for their approval or rejection at the regular city election in December.

The matter was taken up with the council by Mr. Blake and R. O. Graves last evening. They stated they had hoped to have a sufficient number of council men present so that the council could submit the franchise and the charter amendment to the people instead of having it submitted through the initiative and referendum law which requires the submission of any question signed by a certain per cent of the voters. As Councilman Hennessey and Powers were absent, an ordinance could not be passed by the council and as last night was the last meeting at which action could be taken they wished the council would have the question submitted in the most favorable manner possible.

Finally on motion of Councilman Coke, the resolution was unanimously passed.

The questions to be submitted by Mr. Blake are the amendment to the city charter which eliminates the present provision requiring that the consent of owners of seventy-five per cent of the property abutting on the street desired for a right of way must be secured. Also the franchise itself.

Mr. Blake explained that the franchise itself had been so amended, that he is required to begin the actual construction of the street railway within sixty days after the election or forfeit it.

BOLT ELECTED
1909 CAPTAIN

Marshfield High School Football Team Organized For Year.

At a meeting of the Marshfield high school boys last evening, Eric Bolt was elected captain of the 1909 football team. Chauncey F. Clarke was chosen manager for the season.

The team will begin practice at once and the prospects are that they will have the best football aggregation in the history of the Marshfield high school. Seven members of last year's team are back in school and will play and there is better new material this year than the school has had to draw from in a long time. Of the last year's players, Briggs, Wieder, Rasmussen, Stutsman, Bolt, Merchant and Flanagan are back in the game. Among the new men who are candidates for the team are Goss, Jones, Smith, Hutcheson, Harrington and Clarke.

R. O. Graves and Weary Chandler, former football stars, have promised to help coach the team. If a winning team can be rounded into shape, Instructor Hewitt has promised to endeavor to arrange a series of games with Willamette Valley high school teams, the local team making the trip. Mr. Hewitt was a former Willamette University star.

LAUNCH NEW

ROBT. HOE DEAD.

Noted Printing Press Manufacturer Is Stricken.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Robert Hoe, aged seventy, head of Robert Hoe & Company, printing press manufacturers of New York and London, died today after a short illness.

COST OF NEW YORK.

Expenses of the Metropolis Estimated at \$184,000,000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The cost of maintaining the administration of New York during 1910, according to figures to be submitted to the board of estimates and apportionment, will be approximately \$184,000,000, an increase of \$28,000,000 over this year's budget. The magnitude of this sum will be apparent when it is remembered that less than twenty-five years ago the administration of the United States government exclusive of pension disbursements involved an expenditure of public funds of less than \$178,000,000.

HAS BULLET IN BRAIN.

Remarkable Recovery of Man Who Tried to Commit Suicide.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 22.—With a 22-caliber bullet imbedded in his brain, fired there with suicidal intent more than two weeks ago, Frank Blaine left the Casualty hospital in this city yesterday discharged as cured. He said he suffered no discomfort other than pains in the head and neck, and he talked rationally. The surgeons at the hospital who have been observing Blaine closely say they detected no ill effects from the bullet in his brain, and it is their belief he will not suffer from it in future years. An X-ray photograph of the young man's head showed the bullet imbedded in the center of his brain.
