FIFTY INJURED IN STREET CAR WRECK AT SEATTLE TODAY

Motorman Loses Control of Car Crowded With Exposition Passengers.

CRASHES THROUGH SMALL RESTAURANT

One Dead and Several Thought | Chamber of Commerce Hon-Fatally Hurt In Accident.

(By Associated Press.) SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 24. - A nue and East 40th street, a block from the fair grounds entrance, and crashed into a building about noon. Forty were injured, one probably fatally. The seriously hurt were taken to the Emergency hospital at the Fair grounds.
