

CAL WRIGHT ON GAME LAW

Game Warden Says F. W. Reeder Is Mistaken In Interpretation of Law.

Editor Times: In regard to a communication which F. W. Reeder had in the Times yesterday relative to the game laws, I want to say that he is clearly mistaken in their interpretation and I wish to warn sportsmen not to be lead astray by them. The new game law is very explicit on the points he discusses and I will merely have to quote a couple of sections for the benefit of those who may not have ready access to the laws. They are as follows:

"Section 18. Sinkboat, Sneakboat, Skiff, Steam or Gasoline Launch or Other Boat.—It shall be unlawful at any time to use any sinkboat, sneakboat, skiff, steam or gasoline launch or other boat on the Yaquina Bay below Mill Four Slough, or Coos Bay or its tributaries, or on the Columbia River or any of its tributaries (except the Willamette and its tributaries above Oregon City), in the State of Oregon, for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, geese, swan or other water fowl therefrom. It shall be unlawful at any time to use any sinkboat, sneakboat or powerboat on any waters of the State of Oregon for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, geese, swan or other water fowl therefrom."

"Section 21. Blinds.—It shall be unlawful for any person to build or use any blind, or any other structure in any public lake or river in the State of Oregon, or in the Columbia River, or in any lake in the State of Oregon which is not wholly owned by himself, his lessor or licensee, which stands more than the one hundred (100) feet out from the shore or margin of such lake or river, for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, geese, swan or other water fowl therefrom at any time."

MIXED RACES CAN'T MARRY

Law Passed by Washington Legislature Now In Force.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 1. — No longer will judges and ministers of Washington be troubled with people of mixed nationalities wishing to get married, for according to a law passed at the recent session of the legislature, miscellaneous marriage is prohibited. This forbids the intermarriage of the whites with anyone of either African or Mongolian descent and the hearing of the new law has been heralded with approbation.

At the instigation of a Clark county representative, this bill was rushed through both houses and though it has been passed for some time, the fact is not generally known. A person, who refused to be quoted in the matter, had a hand in the affair and wrote frequent appeals to the various senators, asking them to pass such a measure. That this is now accomplished has been the cause of much rejoicing and judges and clergymen alike will not be forced to incur the enmity of contracting parties who are legally separated by the bar of color.
