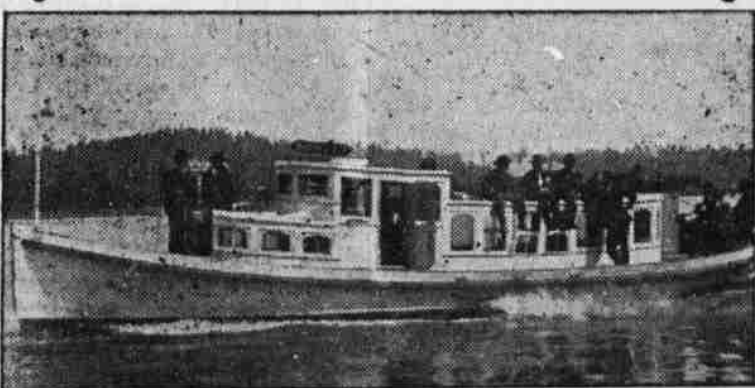

Dr. Rowell Wins.—George Herron has received word that Dr. Rowell, Herron's jumper, has taken two races at Helena on the Montana circuit, winning a half-mile dash and a four and a half furlong dash.

Go to Homesteads.—W. H. Kennedy, J. W. Flanagan, Watt Short and C. A. Howard left today for their homesteads in the Fall Creek country, about twenty miles east of Allegany, where they will spend a week or so. Alton Sengstacken also expects to join them there.

Will Try Roberts.—Judge Coke will go to Coquille in the morning to hold a special session of circuit court to try Robert Roberts who was arrested in North Bend recently on an indictment charging him with stealing a Smith-Powers pay check and cashing it. By holding the special session now and disposing of the case, Judge Coke will save the county the expense of boarding Roberts until the next regular session of court.

Stop Fishing.—Capt. Wagner of the Gerald C which brought in a cargo of fish from the Hume Bros. on Rogue river yesterday announces that the Humes will suspend fishing operations there. The action is the result of the plans of Mrs. Hume, as administratrix, to sell the property. It is understood that the Hume Brothers are endeavoring to secure backing to buy the land so far as it has to do with the Rogue river fishing rights.

Will Seek Claims.—A dozen or so Marshfield men are planning to file on the two townships to be thrown open by the government near the Coos-Douglas county line, October 9. They will leave here within a few

days. Some have "squatted" on the tracts and will try and hold it although script has been filed on some of it.

Start Colored School.—The Marshfield colored school was reopened yesterday by Mrs. Pennock, the teacher. Burt Gow Why was again the only pupil but the school board has decided that the other Orientals and negroes of school age here must attend and the trustee officer will be sent out to round them up. Mrs. Trollinger who has been keeping her children out of school on the ground that the negroes are entitled to attend the regular grades, will be required to send her children to the colored school under the truancy law.

The Revival Meeting.—The revival meetings now in progress at the Lutheran Hall, have taken on the air of a revival from the beginning. The subject for last night was "The Gospel," and Evangelist Gregg made plain the fact that the power of the Gospel is as great today as at any other period of time, and that its seeming failure to accomplish greater things is chargeable to a lack of united effort on the part of its adherents. Mr. Gregg will discuss plain practical themes at each service and all who attend will be benefited. Miss Flook has charge of the music.
