

WILL ENFORCE EDUCATION LAW

Trauant Officer to Round Up Marshfield Youngsters Not In School.

It is announced that the Marshfield school board and Superintendent Golden are preparing to strictly enforce the Oregon compulsory education law here and a truant officer will probably get busy within a few days. The law is very rigid and while it is understood that there are not many violations of it here, there are a few to be dealt with.

The following is a synopsis of the Oregon compulsory education law:

Applies to Whom—All children between and including the ages of 9 and 14 years, and all children between the ages of 14 and 16 years not regularly engaged in some useful employment, must attend school each year as long as school is taught in the district in which the parent or guardian lives.

Exceptions—Children taught in the common school branches at home or in a private school or by a private tutor, such instructions to be equivalent to that given in the public schools.

Children that can prove by an examination that they have mastered the common school branches, such examination to be given by the county eighth grade examining board.

Children who are physically unable to attend school, a physician's certificate being accepted as competent evidence.

Children between the ages of 9 and 10 years who live more than one and one-half miles from school, and older children who live more than three miles from school by the nearest traveled road.

Trauant Officers—One or more appointed by the district boundary board for districts of the second and third class; compensation shall not exceed \$2 per day for time employed, to be paid out of the general fund of the county.

Trauant officers for districts of the first class appointed by the school board and paid from the fund of the district.

Plan of Enforcement—School clerk required to furnish teacher or principal with a copy of the school census, together with the names and addresses of parents and guardians.

Teacher or principal required to compare such census with enrollment once each month and report to the secretary of the district boundary board the names of all children not in regular attendance at school. Eight unexcused half days' absence during any four weeks constitutes irregular attendance.

Secretary of district boundary board required to notify truant officer. Truant officer shall within 24 hours, serve written notice in person or by registered mail, upon parent or guardian, directing him or

her to send child or children to school on the following Monday, and that the attendance of such child or children must be continuous during the remainder of the school year. At the same time the truant officer notifies the teacher or principal that he has served such notice upon the parent or guardian.

If parent or guardian fails to comply, the truant officer is required within three days to file a complaint before a justice of the peace, who shall issue warrant and proceed to hear the case in the same manner as other offenders are tried.

Penalty—Parent or guardian, if convicted, liable to fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25, or imprisonment in county or city jail not less than two nor more than ten days, or both fine and imprisonment.

It is the duty of school officers, teachers, principals and superintendents to assist in the enforcement of this law, neglect of duty on their part punishable by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$20.

It was decided last week to make a test of the Arago gravel for street paving. The first test will be made on First street below the plank paving, toward the depot. If it proves a success in this place it will be more extensively used before the winter is over.

Tim Seeley came up from his camp down the river Tuesday suffering from a badly bruised leg, the result of a blow from a block of wood which was thrown on a car he was loading. He will probably be laid up for week or two with the injured limb.

Miller, who is 85 years of age, and by Mrs. Webb and Miss Gertie Miller who accompanied him on his visit east. private conveyance for Roseburg where Mrs. Tollman will spend the winter with her sister. It is thought by the physicians in charge that a winter spent at Roseburg will benefit Mrs. Tollman's health. In the meantime Mr. Tollman will spend the winter in an endeavor to interest outside capital in some of the many dormant possibilities of Coos county, particularly the Coquille valley.

Mr. Heaton has been a resident of Oregon for the past thirty-five years, having come west in 1875, and he stated Monday morning that during that entire time he had never had a moments desire to return to the east until the present time. Mr. Heaton is now seventy-six years of age and his brother, who resides in Milwaukee is ten years his junior.

The Coquille Telephone exchange is to have considerable work done on it during the next two weeks and it will be made as nearly up to the modern standard of telephone exchanges as the central office equipment will permit. There has been considerable talk of the company installing the common battery system but the company found it was impossible to secure the necessary equipment from the factory this fall so the matter will have to be postponed until a later date.
