Pays Fine.—Walter Jensen yesterday afternoon appeared in Justice Pennock's court and paid a fine of \$25 for shooting ducks out of a boat. He was arrested by Game Wardens Wright and Noah Sunday. There had been talk of making a test case of his offense but it didn't materialize and Justice Pennock imposed the minimum fine when Mr. Jensen pleaded guilty.

Kuettner Coming.—W. P. Murphy received a letter yesterday from Promoter Kuettner of the Roseburg and Coos Bay electric line saying that all of the preliminaries had been closed and that he would probably reach Coos Bay on the Breakwater Friday to push the project. Mr. Murphy is now securing office rooms for him, it being the intention to open headquarters here.

Went to Portland.—Marshal Carter has been advised that the relatives of Mrs. Zina Campbell, the Gardiner woman whose sudden departure from the Bay caused quite a stir here a few weeks ago, did not attempt to force her to return home. She went on to Portland where she

is now. Marshal Carter says that this is the second time that she has suddenly left, causing her folks at Scottsburg considerable worry.

Breaks Arm Again.—Julius Nelson, the ten-year-old son of Julius Nelson of Haines Inlet, broke his arm while playing with other children at school this morning. He was brought to Marshfield and the fracture was reduced by Drs. McCormac and Golden. This is the second injury of the kind that young Nelson has sustained within two years, the first time breaking his right arm and this time the left arm.

Kills Fine Dog.—Geo. A. Gould reports that one of his best varmint dogs was killed by a wounded buck last week. He was out hunting when the dog ran across the trail of a wounded buck. Usually, the hound would not pay any heed to the deer trail but the blood caused him to take it up. He failed to show up and Mr. Gould went to look for him and found him dead, gored by the buck. The latter was lying a short distance away and was easily killed by Mr. Gould.

May Be Grayling.—Local boatmen are considerably interested in a story of Captain Hanson of the schooner Dora Blum which reached Portland recently. Captain Hanson reported that he had passed an overturned vessel in southern waters. LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"The best example I have seen of the flesh producing qualities of the Coos Bay climate is A. F. Burkhardt," remarked Chas. Big Gain Hunter of the O. K. In Weight. Barber Shop, the other day. "I suppose it will surprise you when I tell you that he weighs 366 pounds, a gain of sixty-five pounds in the six or seven months he has been on the Bay. I guess that it is gaining some weight, about sixty-five pounds more than Burkhardt wishes he had gained."

"There is nothing in the tales of ill-luck attached to the various omens you hear about," remarked Louis Keating the other day. "I had it demonstrated in my case but I didn't say much about it until the hoodoos had time to get in their work. This year my birthday fell on Friday, August 13. The combination of Friday and thirteen wasn't all of it for I was twenty-three, I didn't suffer ill-luck and I guess that will shatter the claims of the believers in omens or hoodoos."
