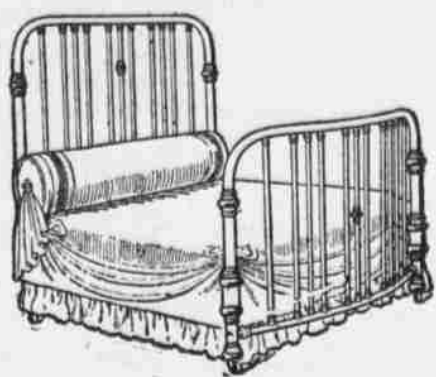


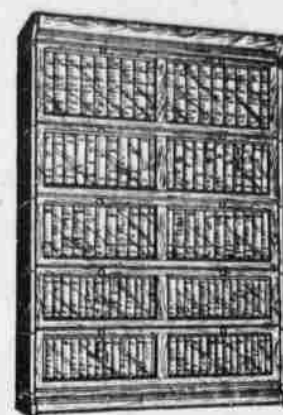

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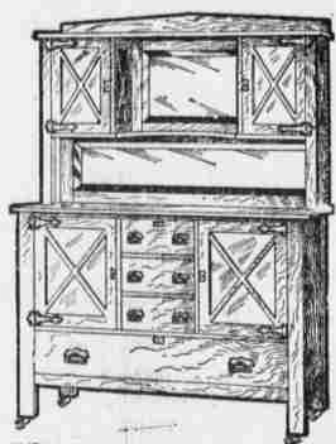

FAKE OFFICER IS HEARD OF

Alleged Recruiting Officer Who
Worked Coos Bay Men,
Now In Iowa.

"Lieut. Hinds" who worked a number of Coos Bay men out of \$100 or so several months ago when he came here on the claim that he was to establish a recruiting station here for the United States Army, has made a big jump eastward and is now working the middle west on the same game he played here. Since his departure for Portland to bring down the men to take charge of the recruiting station, the fake army officer has never been heard of and the "loans" he extracted on "good fellowship" have never been paid. Of his recent operations, a dispatch from Burlington, Iowa, gives the following particulars:

"What was undoubtedly one of the cleverest swindles ever perpetrated upon an unsuspecting business community was that engineered by 'Lieutenant' V. M. Whittaker, who claimed to be of troop H of the Seventh cavalry, U. S. A. Whittaker blew into Burlington Tuesday, and took several good citizens by storm. He put up at the Delano hotel, and at once went about the city stating his business. He was the advance agent of seven companies of troops of the Seventh cavalry then stationed at Jefferson barracks, St. Louis, which was to start on a forced march to Fort Snelling, Minn., the next day. The troops were expected to arrive in Burlington about the 10th of October, and would camp here ten days. Whittaker's business was to procure suitable camping grounds, and supplies. He had no trouble getting contracts for about \$3,000 worth of camp supplies, grain, provisions, etc. He was a good talker, and had the manner and air of a military man. He was introduced at the Elks' Club and became acquainted with many leading business and professional men. In

making his contracts he informed the people he was dealing with that the government was compelled to require certain security for the prompt fulfillment of contracts, and asked that such security be made over to him in the shape of certified checks which would be returned when the supplies were delivered. A large tract of land was rented, and the city appeared to wake up to the fact that it was to have a big time. Some four hundred soldiers, a dozen supply wagons, and many cavalry horses were to be quartered here for ten days.

"Whittaker undoubtedly succeeded in getting his pockets full of contracts and certified checks. Wednesday afternoon he ordered a fine supper at the hotel for six of his newly made friends. The supper was prepared but the lieutenant failed to appear. In fact he could not be found within the city limits. His room at the hotel was searched, and was found to contain only a pair of white shoes and an umbrella, the latter of which he had borrowed from a newly made acquaintance. The police were called into the case, and every effort is being made to locate the man, who is believed to be nothing more than a clever swindler. It is impossible to learn how much money the fellow got out of Burlington as many who gave checks decline to say anything about the matter."

LEMON FOR LEMON GROWERS

Railways Hand It to Them In Increased Freight Rates.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Pleas for the poor lemon growers of California during the tariff discussion in congress resulted in an increase of the duty on that fruit of 50 cents a hundred pounds, this being deemed necessary to equalize the cost of production at home and abroad, including delivery at the Atlantic seaboard, and a fair profit for the American producer. Now it appears that the poor lemon grower is to get but 35 cents of the increased protection, the trans-continental railroads having raised the freight rate for lemons 15 cents a hundred.

WRITES ABOUT BOND ISSUE

Local Investors Confuse General City Issue With Special Improvement Bonds

Some of the local investors who have been figuring on buying Marshfield municipal bonds have confused the general bond issue of the city and the special improvement bonds. The general bond issue of \$54,000 is twenty-year five per cent securities while the special improvement and sewer bonds are ten-year refunding bonds and bear six per cent interest. Owing to the general issue being so large and at a low rate of interest, the council in advertising for bids requires that the purchaser pay the cost of printing the bonds and to furnish a certified check for \$2,500 with his bid that he will take the bonds if awarded to him. This was done as this class of securities is seldom parcelled out by cities in small amounts to several purchasers but are sold in a lump to one concern and are issued in \$500 denomination so that he may dispose of them later if he so desires.

The special improvement bonds do not require the purchaser to pay for the printing of the bonds or any other expense and are sold in denominations to suit the purchaser. This is the explanation of City Recorder Butler in reply to the inquiry contained the following letter:

COQUILLE, Sept. 30, '09.
Editor Coos Bay Times:
I see an ad. in The Times for sealed proposals for municipal bonds ranging from \$100.00 to \$1,000.00 denominations. Purchaser to furnish blank bond and to defray expenses of preparation thereof. Each bid to be accompanied by certified check of reputable banking house payable to the treasurer of the City of Marshfield in the sum of \$2,500.00 which shall be forfeited in case bidder fails to comply with the terms of his bid. "I am from Missouri," please show me how a man can buy \$100.00 or

\$1,000.00 bond when he has to furnish a certified check for \$2,500.00 when he has only \$1,000.00 or \$2,000.00 to invest.

Printing alone would cost him more than the interest on a small investment.

Would you kindly give space in your paper for an explanation as there are others that would like to thoroughly understand it.
