WRECK NEAR PORTLAND.

One Killed and Several Injured Last Night.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 6.—Eastbound passenger train No. 4, on the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railroad, which left this city shortly after 6 o'clock last night, was wrecked by a landslide at 11 o'clock between Fountain and Sandal, 125 miles east of here. Engineer C. A. Bigsby was killed, Fireman B. F. Bear seriously injured; Express Messenger F. Koehler sustained severe scalp wound, and Mail Clerk H. C. Pettit was severely bruised about the head. The engine, baggage car and tourist car left the rails. The engine overturned. No passengers were hurt. The road will be cleared this afternoon.
