

## ALLIANCE TO SAIL SATURDAY

Repairs On Wessel Will Be Easily Completed This Week.

Tom James, agent of the Alliance, last evening received a telegram from Portland announcing that she would sail from there Saturday evening on her regular schedule without fail. The damage to the vessel has not been as great as was feared.

Concerning the Alliance, a Portland paper says: "Examination of the Alliance on dock revealed the exact extent of the damage. Her rudder, rudder post and shoe were carried away, but beyond that there is nothing wrong. The report that the vessel was leaking badly is wrong. The craft failed to take any water."

Captain E. D. Parsons stated yesterday the Alliance struck well inside the bar and soundings and charts showed 20 feet of water. In the opinion of Captain Parsons, the Alliance struck either a rock which had been washed away from the jetty or else hit the old boilers of a wrecked steamship. Years ago a steamer was lost in crossing the Coos Bay bar, and records show that the boilers were never removed.

The steamship Nome City, owned by the same firm will not be placed on the Coos Bay run for a trip. It is the intention to rush the work so that the craft will be able to sail on schedule Saturday evening.

Captain Parsons denied the rumor that he has resigned command of the steamship Alliance. The rumor was current on the front yesterday that he had left the service of the Gray & Holt Company."

### TIME FOR WORK ONLY.

Wife Had No Opportunity For Diversions.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Marie Mann, wife of John Lester Mann, a bonanza wheat rancher in Spokane county, states in her petition for divorce, filed in the superior court here, that the routine for her four years of married life left no time for visiting relatives or neighbors, to say nothing of bridge whist and music. Her complaint, in brief, presents the appended schedule of duties:

Rise at 4 o'clock a. m.  
Exercise with a cross-cut saw on a pile of logs.

Get breakfast for a threshing crew of 30 men, each possessed of a healthy appetite.

After breakfast the schedule is:  
Plant or dig potatoes and do chores.

Clean the barn and chop wood for the cook stove.

Load several wagons with sacked grain to take to market.

Cook dinner for 30 threshermen, with appetites as mentioned.

Afternoon recreation is thus set forth:

Butcher hogs and make sausage.  
Chores and woodchopping, also milking a dozen cows.

Prepare supper for the same crew of hungry harvesters and clean the house.

Evening at home:

Darn socks, make bread and do other work till 10 o'clock p. m.; bed on a pallet of straw on the floor of the cookhouse.

The complaint closes with the declaration that Mrs. Mann was literally forced by her husband to perform the tasks mentioned in the foregoing, alleging also that when she was too sick to work he refused to permit her to go to her mother's house.

Mann declines to talk about the charges preferred by his wife. He has not engaged counsel to defend the action.

## MARSDEN WINS CONTROVERSY

Councilman Savage who seemed to have planned Mr. Marsden's reconstructed building how much new material was being used and the latter said about half. Councilman Albrecht wanted to know how much more space there would be in the reconstructed building, and Mr. Savage said about 100 per cent. Mr. Savage said that the wall on one side had been raised ten feet and on the other side four feet.

Councilman Coke then wanted to know if it wouldn't be possible to have Mr. Marsden plaster the interior which would be expensive. He said if he had known it in the first place, he could have had it plastered. He said that it wouldn't be a two-story building, merely a one-story structure with a high ceiling to afford more air space for the theatre.

Messrs. Goss and Savage said that the building as reconstructed would reduce the fire hazard. Mr. Savage said that the old buildings were an awful trap.

Finally on motion by Councilman Hennessey, seconded by Councilman Powers, Mr. Marsden was granted permission to complete the structure. Councilmen Albrecht called for an aye and nay vote, resulting in Councilmen Savage, Powers and Hennessey voting aye and Councilmen Albrecht, Nay, Nelson and Coke not voting.

Later, Councilman Albrecht said that he thought it was high time for the council to stop dilly-dallying along and enact a building ordinance whereby everyone would be treated alike. He said that Mr. Gulovson had been refused a permit to do practically the same thing. He said he wanted to have everybody treated the same. He moved that a new building ordinance be drafted to take the place of what he termed the "present farce."

He said the new one should be so drafted that no permits could be granted by the council and should clearly regulate the amount of improvements or repairs that can be made.

Mayor Straw warmly approved of Mr. Albrecht's stand and said that he felt the same way about it. He instructed Chairman Savage to take the matter up at once. Mr. Turpen who was present said that the ordinance he drafted some time ago would be all right with possibly a few changes and offered to assist in revising it and his offer was accepted.

Mr. Turpen's resignation, tendered because his other duties would not permit him to act as building, plumbing and sewer inspector, was accepted.

### Plan For Debates.

Oregon High Schools Enter Third Year This Fall.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 7.—The Oregon State High School Debating League will begin its third year this fall with brighter prospects of success than at any previous time in its history. Prof. E. L. DeCou of the University, who is secretary of the League, has received a number of applications from new schools for admission. The triangular plan of debate, in use by the state universities of Idaho, Washington and Oregon has been endorsed by the League. The October number of the University Bulletin will be devoted to the interests of the League and will give the subjects for the year, references for material, and a full description of the triangular plan.

### ENROLLMENT AT EUGENE.

Oregon State University Has 1,000 Students.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 7.—Registration in all departments of the University of Oregon has reached 1,000 students. In the colleges of Liberal Arts and Engineering, the enrollment now is nearly 600 students, and the total registration for the year in these two departments will reach 700, an increase over last year of 20 per cent. The freshman class, all of whom are High School Graduates, number 250 students. Graduates from practically every four-year high school in Oregon have entered the university this fall, and there is also a very noticeable number of students entering who are graduates of high schools outside of Oregon.

## A. H. POWERS WINS RECORD

Marshfield Logging Concern Said to Do More Work Than Any Other.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 7.—Marshfield, although not first in the lumber manufacturing and logging industries of Oregon, has won the palm of heaviest logging work by any single concern. The Smith-Powers Logging Company, which furnishes logs for the C. A. Smith sawmill, has reached the enormous total of 600,000 feet of timber delivered in a single day, and it is understood that from 500,000 to 600,000 a day is a common record since the system has been fully equipped.

The logging company is under the management of Al Powers, one of the best known loggers of Minnesota in the days of great lumber manufacturing there. He was associated with Tony Dwyer, of the E. C. Shevlin Company for many years, gaining the experience that enabled him to come to the great Oregon field and commence breaking delivery records.

The Smith-Powers logging plant is well situated for best results. A splendid body of timber is near the bay, and the railway tapping it consists of short spurs or branches, making the haul as short as may be and yet get back from the water's edge into the forest. It is the short line of railway that makes work rapid. Unless construction is extraordinarily heavy and equipment is like that used on transcontinental lines, long lines must work more slowly. The Smith-Powers Company has very large bodies of timber situated for as economical results over many years as have been attained in the operations now in full swing.

### ELECTION IN ROSEBURG.

Dr. Haynes and Ticket Successful In Municipal Contest.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 7.—With the exception of one candidate for councilman, the City Improvement ticket, headed by Dr. F. W. Haynes, was entirely victorious at Monday's biennial election in Roseburg. The sole exception was R. L. Stephens, who was beaten for councilman in West Roseburg (Ward No. 5) by Arthur A. Jones.

Out of a total of 799 votes, the largest ever cast at a municipal election in this city, Dr. Haynes received 472 against 327 for Mr. Strong, a majority of 145. City Recorder A. N. Orcutt is re-elected over Andrew R. Marker by a majority of 104, the total votes being 440 to 336. City Treasurer E. B. Hermann, who was a candidate to succeed himself, had no opposition and he received 667 votes.
