PAY CLAIM OF QUAKE VICTIM

Alton Grimes of Coquille, Will Receive \$1,000 Insurance.

An echo of the San Francisco earthquake disaster and the mystery surrounding the disappearance of John Grimes and his wife, reached here today in an announcement that the W. O. W. had approved of the claim for Mr. Grimes' insurance. He carried a policy of \$1,000 in the order and this will go to his twenty-year-old son, Alton Grimes, who has been making his home in Coquille.

Grimes was well-known on the Bay, having been a stationary engineer here for years. He worked on the jetty construction and ran a pile driver for a long time. His first wife died and later he took a niece of John Leneve as his second wife. His first wife was a sister of Mrs. John Leneve of Coquille and Alton Grimes is her son.

They went to San Francisco and were known to have lived in a building that was destroyed by the quake and later burned. No trace of them could be found and owing to the inability to establish positive proof of his death, the insurance money was withheld until now.

HILL KEEPS BUSY.

Will Build All Railways That Northwest Will Support.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—James J. Hill passed through Chicago on his way to New York, remaining here long enough to have a conference with John F. Stevens, who is in charge of new construction for the Hill lines in the Pacific Northwest. Mr. Hill intimated that the aggressive policy which he has adopted with respect to railroad construction into new territory in the west and northwest would not be abated on account of the death of Edward H. Harriman.

"We intend to build all the lines that are warranted by the development of the country in the northwest," declared Mr. Hill, "and possibly some which are not warranted by present development. Yes, we are going to build a line south in the center of the State of Oregon from a point on the Columbia river. I cannot tell you how far we will go with that line. It depends upon conditions."

Millionaire Provides That Anyone who Contests shall have Only \$10.

NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 6.—A clause providing that any one contesting his will should be cut off with \$10 and his portion be divided among the other beneficiaries is a notable feature of the will of John A. Griswold, who died at his home here recently, leaving an estate estimated at about \$25,000,000. The estate is distributed among relatives, Mr. Griswold's daughters, Mrs. John M. Forbes of New York, and Mrs. M. A. Gross, wife of Major Gross, U. S. A., being the principal beneficiaries.
