To Form Auto Club.—J. E. Schilling and other auto owners of the city have called a meeting at the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening to form an automobile club.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up several matters. While Mayor Straw will be unable to be present, it is understood that he will have the appointment of J. D. Goss as city attorney submitted.

Found Guilty.—Justice Penneck handed down his decision today finding Dr. A. C. Burroughs guilty of practicing medicine without a license. As Dr. Burroughs has made application for a license and owing to other extenuating circumstances, Justice Penneck waived the fine, holding Dr. Burroughs liable for the costs only.

Injured Improving.—Mayor Straw and Mrs. Straw are reported considerably improved today. Mrs. Straw suffered a brief relapse from the nervous shock yesterday afternoon but both passed a fairly comfortable night. Doctor Straw suffers considerable pain but bears up under it like a Trojan. He had telegrams last night and this morning from friends in Seattle and San Francisco expressing sympathy and hopes for his early recovery.

Auto Hits Rail.—L. M. Munson of Vermont who is visiting C. R. Peck yesterday had a narrow escape from a bad auto accident. He had driven Mr. Peck's new machine out to the Peck home and was returning down town. While he was running out, some workmen who were repairing the street put a rail across the thoroughfare at Fourth street. Mr. Munson not being aware of the change came back at a good

clip and struck the rail, smashing both lamps on the machine. He escaped injury and no other damage was done to the machine. Later a bicyclist struck the rail and was thrown from his wheel. He picked up the railing and heaved it over into the swamp.

Saling Dismissed.—True Saling, the taxidermist who was arrested by Game Wardens Wright and Noah on the charge of having a dead spotted fawn in his possession has been dismissed by Justice Penneck. Mr. Saling proved that the fawn had been accidentally killed by his dog and that later he had mounted it to keep. As the fawn wasn't killed for barter or sale, Justice Penneck decided that he had not violated the law.

DRAIN BIG TRACT.

Reclaim 2,500 Acres in Fat Elk District.

BANDON, Ore., Oct. 11.—Report comes from the Fat Elk Drainage District that work on the big ditch is progressing very rapidly and will probably be finished by about the middle of the month after which work will begin at once on the smaller ditches leading into this one and draining the land from various points.

By this drainage system about 2,500 acres of land, which has heretofore been a swamp will be reclaimed and put under cultivation. It is some of the richest land in this section of Oregon. It will be a big accession to the productive soil of the valley. This district lies along the Coquille river, near Coquille City.

The first estimate of the amount of dirt to be removed was 186,000 yards to cover the entire system. Over 60,000 yards of this has already been removed and the big machine which was constructed in the shipyards at this place is removing dirt at the rate of two yards a minute, which means about 1,200 yards a day of ten hours.

The dredging company is supposed to have the work completed by January 1st, but owing to a number of difficulties to be surmounted, they may not finish quite so soon, but it will all be completed before spring, unless something unforeseen happens.
