OREGON—Showers tonight and Tuesday in west; fair with increasing cloudiness east.

Meet Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet Tuesday evening to take up various matters.

Many On Excursion.—The Liberty took an excursion party of about forty to Enegren's Grove yesterday and a delightful outing was enjoyed, the weather being almost perfect for picnicking.

Drain Line Rumor.—Someone started a report yesterday that the Southern Pacific was about to resume the construction of the Drain line, claiming that large shipments of ties for the work had been received in Drain during the last few days.

Is Operated On.—Mrs. Frank Denning who went to San Francisco last week for medical treatment underwent an operation at Lane hospital Friday morning. A brief note from there is to the effect that the operation was successful which will be gratifying news to her many friends on the Bay.

Meet Tonight.—A meeting of the veterans of the Spanish-American and Philippine war veterans will be held at the office of Clarke and Graves this evening for the purpose of organizing a post of the national society here. There are a number of veterans of these wars around the Bay, and it is believed that most of them will join.

Work Sunday.—In order to insure the completion of the paving in the down town section before the rainy season stops the work, Contractor Whitmore had a crew of men working yesterday. He has been handicapped by delays in securing the bituminous rock paving but expects to have sufficient to complete the projects now underway within a short time.
