Events There As Told By the Gold Beach Globe.

Owing to heavy seas that detained the Coast and being out of ice the Union Fisheries lost about nine hundred salmon which they were forced to throw overboard.

POSTER SHEET BALLOT.

1,000 Candidates On New York Ticket—Size 4 Feet 5 Inches By 19 Inches.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The ballot to be voted at the municipal election in this city on November 2, will be the largest sheet in the city's history, if the board of elections decides that all the certificates of nominations that have been filed are valid.

The sheets will measure 4 feet, 5 inches wide and 19 inches deep, and will contain the names of 1,000 candidates in 21 columns.

The Wilhelmina will probably cross out today for Bandon with a miscellaneous cargo.

The tugs Gleaner and Roscoe leave today for the Umpqua and Siuslaw, respectively.

The Simpson Lumber Company's schooner, the Echo, which has been tied up in the bay for some time, is to take a cargo of lumber from the C. A. Smith mill south this week.

The Albert Meyer which was to have loaded at the Railroad dock with lumber from the Johnson mill, will load at the C. A. Smith mill, there not being a cargo in sight at the Railroad wharf.

The Gerald C, which has been plying in the Rogue River and Coos Bay fish trade, will leave for the north in a day or two. She has been under lease by the Hume Brothers and will return to the Columbia river service.

The Nann Smith will probably cross out today with a large cargo for Bay Point, equalling her best record. Just a week ago today she sailed for Bay Point, unloaded her cargo there and returned here and took on another cargo inside of seven days. In addition to that she had to wait several hours here for some of the schooners that were loading at the mill to finish their cargo and get out of her slip.
