

DUNHAM HAS NEW PROJECT

Would Build Steamer For Coos Bay-Portland-Eureka Run.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 19.—The Journal says: "A. Dunham, who was formerly chief engineer of the Argo, has disposed of his interest in the steamer and it is reported that he is promoting a project to build a new steel steamer for the Eureka, Coos Bay and Portland trade. It is said that the proposed steamer will be 200 feet long, 35 feet beam and will draw only 8 feet of water, which would allow her to enter any port along the coast."

PLAN FOR EXPOSITIONS.

Washington May Keep Seattle Exhibit For Them.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 19.—Gov. M. E. Hay favors keeping intact the exhibit of Washington state at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, so as to provide a nucleus for displays at future world's fairs. There are three in sight now, at which it is recognized the Evergreen state must be suitably represented. They are scheduled for Winnipeg in 1912; the Panama Canal Exposition at San Diego, Cal., in 1915; the Tokyo Exposition in 1917. Gov. Hay says there is enough of the original appropriation of \$400,000 made by the state for the A.-Y.-P. left to use to keep up the state exhibit. He wants it preserved at the University grounds in one of the semi-permanent buildings, where all visitors to Seattle can view it, as in San Francisco where the California Promotion Committee keep a permanent exhibit.

MARSHFIELD AND SEATTLE.

It is difficult to realize that no longer ago than the early eighties Seattle was no larger than Marshfield and had no railroads, in fact most of Seattle's development has taken place within very recent years. It is a fact that development is becoming more rapid as the country grows older. More is being done in five years now than was accomplished in twenty when the coast was first brought to the attention of the balance of the country. This means that an undeveloped section such as south and central Oregon will show a very remarkable growth when development opens and it looks very much as though that stage of development was now right at hand. The prospects are very flattering for magnificent returns from investments made anywhere on the coast.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

COOS COUNTY'S BIG POTATOES

Ranchers Near Myrtle Point Exhibit Record Breaking Tubers There.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "The potato harvest is on and potato tubers are ripe, but the Enterprise has substantial proof that they are not all yams, for the spuds have been left here to prove some of the biggest of the stories. Lloyd Spires has produced the best hill, in which there were five potatoes, the longest one being 15 inches and the shortest 10 inches long. The five weighed 13 pounds, the largest going it alone at 3 1/4 pounds. They are Oregon Burbanks with nice smooth white skin and perfect throughout. Albert Barklow produced three potatoes of a red variety that weighed 5 3/4 pounds. All of these were grown on the river bottom close to Myrtle Point. Will Krantz of the East Fork country registered in with a Sir Walter Raleigh and a red one weighing 3 3/4 pounds apiece. The Folsom boys also did something in the big potato line. Forty-eight of their spuds filled a two-bushel sack so full that it couldn't be sewed. Other growers are known to have raised some immense potatoes and any of the crops attest the fertility of the soil in this section."

MYRTLE POINT BUSY.

A stranger coming into Myrtle Point on one of these pleasant autumn days when no one is to be seen on the streets might think that the town is thoroughly dead, but the situation looks good to those who understand it. Interpreted it means that every man who will work is busy making from \$2.50 per day as laborer's wages to the income of the dairymen who are getting rich so fast that they haven't time to count up. There are no loafers in evidence, and the future offers lively enough times in town when the weather interferes with outdoor work and everyone will have a bit of money to turn into the regular trade channels.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

NEW MASONIC TEMPLE.

Myrtle Point Lodge Is Building Fine Home.
