No Developments.—There has been no further developments in the electric railroad movement between here and Coos Bay since Messrs. Kuetner and Ringler were here last week and they have not yet made any report to the local committee since they returned to Portland. —Roseburg Review.

Reduce Plank Walks.—There is talk among the members of the council of adopting an ordinance prohibiting the laying of plank sidewalks within the fire limits. It will probably be taken up by the council soon. Some are regretting that it wasn't enacted before the large amount of new plank recently put in was laid. The object is to eliminate rats and further improve the town.

It seems that the chimney was defective and the boards near it became so charred that they were smoldering. Mrs. Smith and others noticed the smoke and an investigation resulted in the burning boards being found and the threatened fire extinguished. The damage was slight. No alarm was turned in.

DIRECT LINE TO STATION

Will Connect Marshfield Up
With Life Saving Crew For
Benefit of Shipping.

Manager Otto Schetter of the Western Union, is completing arrangements to put in a private telephone line between Marshfield and the United States Life Saving Station at the bar to establish better means of communication for the benefit of shipping. The expense of maintaining the line will be defrayed by the local ship owners and agents, a charge of \$2 per month being from each.

The government maintains a telephone line across the bay from the station to Empire but owing to a federal regulation, it is not connected up with the local exchange. The government will not permit any of its lines to be connected up with a commercial line.

In the present instance, arrangements for the connection was made on account of the benefit to shipping.

S. R. BELLOATE, who formerly ran a second-hand store here, expects to leave in a day or two for Portland where he will engage in the real estate business.

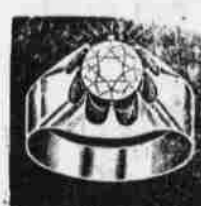
MRS. C. M. BYLER will entertain at her home in North Bend tomorrow afternoon. A number of Marshfield ladies have been invited for the afternoon.
