BIG CROWD AT FAIR.

Total Attendance at Seattle Exposition Was 3,740,551.

SEATTLE, Oct. 20.—The total attendance at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition from the time the gates opened on June 1, until the close at midnight, October 16, was 3,740,551. Of this number 2,765,683 were paid admissions and 974,868 were free.

It is estimated that the fair earned a profit of \$200,000. The surplus will be drawn upon to clear the grounds. If any remains after this is accomplished, it will be little. When the fair opened it carried a debt of approximately \$700,000.
