"GETTING TOGETHER"

"A WISE MAN profits by the experience of others, a fool by his own," is the terse and truthful statement of an old adage. The same truth applies to communities. A growing city can learn much from other municipalities and profit greatly by their experiences in civic affairs. The Times has urged the advantage of such action on more than one occasion and in nothing more emphatically and enthusiastically than the emulation of the spirit of harmony that prevails in all prosperous and progressive cities. A recent notable example of this spirit of mutual self help comes from the city of St. Louis. It would be difficult to read the St. Louis newspapers in these days without discovering that the impulse that is impelling that city on to greater effort is the same, practically, that is operating in nearly all of the larger communities of the country. In New York, in Boston, in Philadelphia, in Pittsburgh, in Cleveland, in Buffalo, in Chicago, in Seattle, in San Francisco and in Los Angeles, up and down the land wherever we find great populations inclosed within corporate limits, there is a breaking away from old methods, political, commercial and social. The old time principle of "every man for himself and the devil take the hindmost" has been replaced by one of a higher standard—one in which the common weal is given greater consideration. The "Get-Together" banquet held in St. Louis recently might have been held in any other city with equal appropriateness. It was intended at once to celebrate and to emphasize the fact that the leading men of the community were united for reform and for progress—for the general good of the city in which they live—for the advancement of its every interest and the promotion of every high ideal. One of the greatest obstacles encountered by those who have been engaged in the work of educating the people of our cities out of antiquated prejudices and harmful traditions has been the lukewarm attitude or positive opposition of those engaged in commercial pursuits. The idea of disturbance of business likely to result from the changing of conditions, even where the changes were admittedly for the better; the idea that a change of methods would give others an advantage; the idea that innovation would weaken prestige—the disposition to be content with political, economic and social conditions that are known, rather than to take the risk of encountering new complications—have all combined to hinder the civic reformer and the progressive citizen. But it is evident from the progress that the cities are now making that they did not succeed in discouraging him. St. Louis has recently rejoiced, and has had reason to rejoice, over its great advancement in the last ten years. Through cooperation of the forces that are active and aggressive in every department of its private and public, professional and

business life, marvelous things have been achieved and many more are on the way to achievement.

The representative people of St. Louis have banded together and the results are simply those that come to every community in which the public welfare is given precedence over all other considerations. Coos Bay can well profit by such a conspicuous example of the benefits of "getting together."
