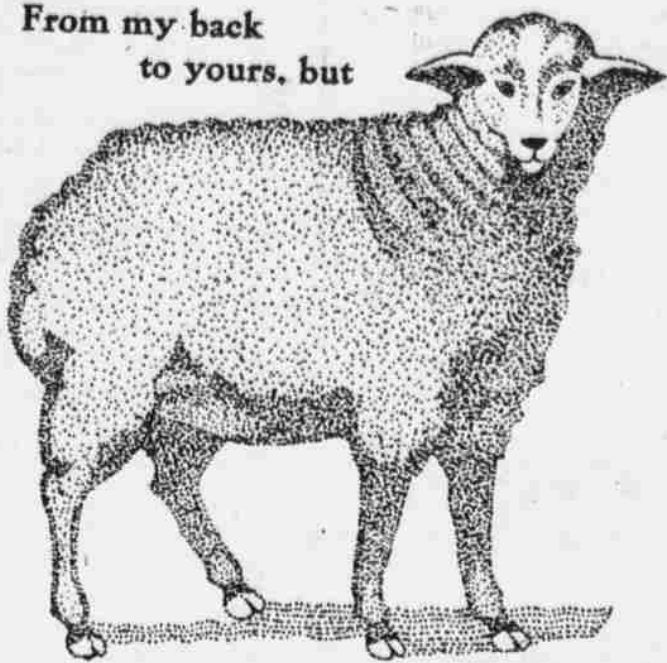

States Land Office has denied

now has sixty days in which to ap-

Fine Exhibits.—An exhibit of five
apples by J. E. Fitzgerald, the well-
known Coos River rancher, tells a
story that should be a lesson to ev-
ery fruit grower in this section.
Three of the apples, about the finest
specimens of the fruit that were
ever gathered, were the products of
a tree that was sprayed. They are
large but are spotted and would be
thrown out as culls or undesirable
fruit by any dealer. They are on
exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber
of Commerce.
