Marshfield High School Prepares For Big Game at North Bend Saturday.

In preparation for the football game between the North Bend and Marshfield high schools teams at North Bend tomorrow afternoon, a rally and bon-fire will be held at the Marshfield high school this evening. Besides the students, it is expected that a number of patrons of the schools besides the teachers and directors, will be present. Great enthusiasm has been worked up over the game. George Murch has been elected yell leader for the boys, and Miss Alpha Mauzey will lead the girls in the new school songs. A parade through town is planned for this evening, if the weather is favorable, and this will be followed by the bon-fire and a program at the high school at which a number of the students, directors and teachers will talk. All classes will participate in the rally.

Game Tomorrow.

Tomorrow's football game promises to be a good one. Both North Bend and Marshfield will have strong teams in the field and both are confident of winning. The game is to be called on the North Bend grounds at 2:30 o'clock and will be full of life and ginger from start to finish. North Bend is anxious to redeem itself for past defeats and Marshfield expects to add another victory to its string.

While Marshfield has not as heavy a team this year as it had last, it will make up in speed what it lacks in beef. Capt. Bolt is perhaps the best center in the county and no fear is held out for that position. Briggs, Wieder and Stutsman of last year's backfield, and Harrington form a combination that is hard to beat. Nichols and Goss, at ends, Merchant and Clarke at tackles, and Jensen and Hennessey at guards will not need looking after and are in the game all of the time. Johnson, Smith, Horton, McCullough and Tribbey will be on the bench.

Coach Hewitt has had his men out regularly and they should be in fine fettle. The North Bend team has also been practicing hard and will be in good shape for tomorrow's game. Among its last year's players who will be in the game again this year are Capt. Van Zile, Gaffney, Stauff, Sweet and Newkirk. With ideal weather conditions, a large crowd is expected to be in attendance. There will be a large number of rooters out.

DEBT OF TEN YEARS IS PAID

Rev. Matt Pesson Returns and Pays Widow of Man Who Befriended Him.

Mrs. Louisa A. Hirst, widow of the late Tom Hirst, a pioneer settler of Coos Bay, this week had the novel experience of receiving \$10 for a debt of \$9.50 which has been owing her husband for more than ten years and the existence of which she was unaware. Incidentally, the payment afforded another man considerable enjoyment—the keeping of his word with a man who had done him a favor so long ago. The latter was Matt Pesson, a former Coos Bay young man, but now a Lutheran minister at Fort Bragg, Cal.

It seems that shortly after Mr. Pesson came to America from Finland, he came to Coos Bay. He was employed at John Bear's livery for a time and later began work on the railway. While employed at the latter work, he was injured and all of his little savings was soon wiped out in doctor's bills and other expenses. Finally he had a chance to study for the ministry. He had no money and his clothing supply was exhausted. As a last resort, he went to Mr. Hirst, whom he knew fairly well and told him his plight. Mr. Hirst told him he would give him the necessary clothing and that he could pay for it when he could. On this condition, the young man took the clothing. If Mr. Hirst ever made a charge of it, it was lost and there was no evidence of it now.

Meanwhile, Mr. Pesson had succeeded in attaining the ministry and had planned to send the money but he wanted to pay it personally and thank the man who had befriended him. He reached here a few days ago and went to Mr. Bear and told him the story. The latter informed him that Mr. Hirst was dead, but that Mrs. Hirst was living and could receive the money. Rev. Pesson went to her, paid her and thanked her.

CAN'T EMPLOY MAILS IN THEIR FLIRTATIONS

Uncle Sam Puts Ban On Girls Using General Delivery Service For Secret Correspondence With Men

DES MOINES, Iowa, Oct. 21.—Flirtations through the Des Moines postoffice may be stopped in the near future, following the plan adopted in the Chicago postoffice.

There is a new rule has gone into effect by which any person getting mail through the general delivery may be compelled to sign an identification card.

Des Moines postal authorities say they would be glad if the same scheme was adopted here. According to postal authorities, the traveling public for whom the general delivery is intended, forms a very small portion of the crowd which gets its letters through that source.

The fact is, Des Moines is one of the greatest affinity towns in the country, judging by the clandestine love missives which go through the general delivery.

The order demanding the true name and address of everyone who gets their mail this way may be issued any day. It's struck Chicago and it's just as apt to strike Des Moines.

The majority of the patrons of the general delivery window are women. There are constant calls at this window all through the day, but the line up of planned hats is longest between 9 and 10 in the morning. Many of them have their mail come under an assumed name. Most generally the mail is in masculine hand writing.

"Any mail for Millie Love?" says a trim little girl in a black suit, stepping up to the window. She gets a letter, hides it quickly in her satchel and hurries away.

"Oh, Gee! He's coming next Sunday," says another girl to her companion, giggling over a mysterious post card. "Don't you ever give me away, Mame. If William ever catches onto this there'll be the Dickens to pay."

There'll be weeping and wailing in the Des Moines postoffice if Uncle Sam applies his Chicago rule here.

GARDINER MAN TO JAIL.

Frank Varrellman Must Serve Thirty Days.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 22.—Two self-confessed "bootleggers" also felt the hand of the law. Frank Varrellman of Gardiner, and W. D. Strange of this city, entered pleas of guilty reversing their former pleas of not guilty, and each received a sentence of 30 days in the county jail. In addition, Varrellman was fined \$200.

In Varrellman's case, a jail sentence was forced by the statute, he having been convicted twice before, paying a fine of \$50 the first time and one of \$100 on the second occasion. In Strange's case fine or imprisonment was optional with the court, but Judge Hamilton stated that to impose a fine would be inflicting a hardship on another person, who would feel obliged to pay it, and he accordingly pronounced a jail sentence so that the penalty for the offense would fall directly upon the offender. He also delivered a fatherly lecture to the defendant, who is still a young man, saying that he had been disappointed to his friends and all others who knew him. Strange declared that his violation of the law was unintentional and that his plea was made upon the advice of his attorney, who had informed him that he was technically guilty.
