Son Dies.—An Albany dispatch announces that the six-year-old son of Rev. Stephen A. Douglas died there of spinal meningitis. Rev. Douglas visited here sometime ago and would have become the pastor

of the Marshfield Baptist church had it not been for the illness of the child who just died.

Child Dead.—The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Will Lynch died yesterday morning and buried in the afternoon. The Rev. H. I. Rutledge officiating. Mrs. Lynch is reported in a critical condition.

New Life Boat.—Capt. Boyce of the local life saving station, has received word that the gasoline life saving boat has been shipped to Coos Bay and he expects it to reach here soon. They have been trying for years to secure it.

Clear Tract.—J. J. Burns is clearing five acres of the forty acres bought at Eagle Point recently by the Odd Fellows Cemetery Association for cemetery purposes. John F. Hall, W. B. Curtis and C. A. Johnson have charge of it.

Lumber Shipments.—August lumber shipments from Coos county are reported by the Lumberman as follows: Prosper mill five cargoes, 1,262,626 feet; Bandon, two cargoes, 304,701; North Bend, four cargoes, 2,727,686; Marshfield, three cargoes, 3,479,830.

Building Work.—Mrs. Moriarty, who recently moved to South Marshfield from the Coquille valley, has ordered lumber for another dwelling which she will erect near her present residence. W. E. Wilson of Ferndale, is making extensive improvements in his residence there.

Baby Is a Girl.—That little stranger that arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Bunch in West Marshfield, turns out to be a girl instead of a boy as stated in The Times last evening. Anyway by the time she is old enough, may be she will be permitted to vote—and what's the use of being a boy anyhow.

Gets Verdict.—In the case of Wilson vs. Franzenbach, Justice Pennock yesterday gave a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$65. Mr. Wilson was suing for \$65 and room rent but the latter claim was set aside. The two were formerly engaged in the marble and monument business on South Broadway. Mr. Franzenbach retiring and the suit resulting from a difference over the terms of settlement.

Bithulthic Man Here.—P. B. Kidd, representing Warren Bros. Construction Company, the patentees of bithulthic paving, is here with a view of getting into the paving game here. Today he and a party of local business men are making a trip up Coos River to inspect the various stone quarries to ascertain if there is the right kind of stone for their pavement. It requiring a harder rock than the sandstone around here. He says that his company will be able to put in paving for \$2.50 or less per yard if they can be assured that 25,000 yards will be laid within a reasonable time.

Tope Case Settled.—The case of Geo. W. Tope, the North Bend moving picture show man, who has been in court on charges growing out of his alleged assault on Rev. J. C. Lininger, the North Bend Presbyterian minister, was amicably settled today. Mr. Tope at a conference with the minister gave his word that he would not molest him any further and the latter withdrew his demand that Tope furnish bond to keep the peace. In consequence, Judge Coke consented to the withdrawal of the habeas corpus proceedings that had been instituted.
