**Mrs. Francis J. Scott Succumbs to Complication
Of Ills.**

Mrs. Francis J. Scott, a well-known woman of South Marshfield, died at the home of her son, Lorenzo Scott, last evening of a complication of ills resulting from her advanced years. She was eighty-three years, seven months and fourteen days old and had been ailing for sometime, her condition having been serious for the past three months.

Francis Jane Scott, nee Sloan, was born in New York in 1826. In 1848, she married Elijah Scott. Later they moved to Iowa, thence to Kansas and thence to Portland where they located thirty years. About twelve years ago, she moved to Coos Bay. Four boys and two daughters were born to them and only two of them are living now, L. D. Scott of Marshfield, and Wm. Scott of Hillsboro.

Rev. Zugg of the Presbyterian church, with which the deceased has long been identified, will conduct the funeral services at the grave Friday.
