of it had objected to such a big appropriation for Coos Bay in view of the commerce here. He said that the chairman of the committee had informed Col. Roessler and others that he would not O K the recommendation but would turn it down. This chairman of the "trimming committee" had suggested the bar dredge and stated that the government wanted to have it given a fair trial, not considering the Chinook experiment at the Columbia a fair one. In deference to this, chairman's wishes, Col. Roessler had changed his recommendations, making one for the bar dredge and one for the jetties.

Tom Bennett told of the recent conference which he and his father had with Senator Bourne in Portland, the gist of which was printed in The Times sometime ago. At this conference, Senator Bourne informed them that it was out of the question to think of getting other than the \$500,000 bar dredge appropriation for Coos Bay at this time and he (Senator Bourne), Mr. Bennett stated, had announced that it would be a hard pull to get the \$500,000. Mr. Bourne had informed them that the engineers' report was in favor of the bar dredge.

I. S. Kaufman said that he was certain Mr. Bourne had misconstrued Col. Roessler's report.

Col. Grimes, Judge Coke, Francis H. Clarke, Claude Nasburg and others took up various phases of the project.

Finally a resolution was passed asking that the special committee to confer with the Oregon delegation and the United States Engineers report back to a general meeting here in two weeks if possible and that the results of the trip would enable Coos Bay to decide what policy to pursue in the future.

HARRIMAN INTERESTS ABANDON ONE ROAD

Will No Longer Seek To Obtain Control of the New York Central Railway.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The plan of the Harriman interests to obtain and secure control of the New York Central has been finally and definitely abandoned in the view of railroad men generally. Evidence of the fact has been accumulating for some time past, and the recent selection of Marvin Hughitt as Harriman's successor on the New York Central board is regarded as a clincher.

Mr. Hughitt has long been president of the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, one of the most important and most prosperous of the Vanderbilt lines, and has been a staunch adherent of the Vanderbilts for many years. He is also a director of the Southern Pacific and Union Pacific, but has never been considered a member of the Harriman party. Mr. Hughitt was born at Genoa Township, Cayuga County, N. Y., in 1837. He started life as a railroad telegrapher. He has lived in Chicago since 1854.
