**New Trial Refused.**—Judge Coke has refused the motion for a new trial in the case of F. K. Gettins vs. Patrick Hennessey in which the verdict was adverse to Hennessey on the first trial. The attorneys in the case, John D. Goss for Mr. Hennessey, and R. O. Graves and C. A. Schibrede for Mr. Gettins, were notified today. Sixty days has been allowed Mr. Hennessey in which to file a bill of exception.

**Survey Siuslaw.**—Wm. G. Carroll and Donald M. Charleston of the United States Engineering office at Portland, arrived here today on the Breakwater en route to the Siuslaw where they will make a new survey of that harbor with a view of making a recommendation to congress for a federal appropriation for the improvement. They have to go to Bandon to secure their instruments first. Mr. Carroll said there was nothing new in the status of Coos Bay harbor work.
