More Strawberries.—D. D. Bralnard, the Haynes Inlet rancher of strawberry fame, was in the city today with forty boxes of as fine strawberries as ever tempted the appetite. He says that his plants are doing well and he will gather berries until the latter part of November at least.

Play Next Saturday.—The North Bend and Marshfield high school football teams will meet again next Saturday afternoon. The game is scheduled to be played at North Bend but Manager Chauncey Clarke of the local team, is trying to get it changed to Marshfield because he believes they will be able to get a much larger crowd here.

Judges Exchange.—Judge J. S. Coke left on the Breakwater today for Eugene where he will hold a session of court for Judge Harris. Judge Harris will come here in December to hold a term of circuit court at which time the actions of Graham, the builder of the local railway, against the Southern Pacific, Spreckels and local men will be tried.

Report Soon.—J. A. Ward, who had charge of Coos county's exhibit at the Seattle fair, returned on the Breakwater yesterday. Some of the county literature that was not distributed at the fair he brought to the Portland Chamber of Commerce

Extend Harbor Lines.—C. R. Peck of the Port of Coos Bay, left today for Portland where he will confer with the United States Engineers relative to the reestablishment of the harbor lines. He will also confer with the Oregon State Land board at Salem relative to the Port, securing any unappointed tidelands within the harbor lines. The securing of tidelands held by private parties within the proposed harbor lines will be taken up later.

Funeral Today.—The funeral of P. G. Larson of North Bend, who was killed in an accident at Smith's Basin the other day, was held today from the Wilson Undertaking parlors. It was largely attended, especially by members of the Modern Woodmen of America of which the deceased was a member. Rev. J. C. Lininger of North Bend, had charge of the services except at the grave where the North Bend M. W. A. Lodge conducted its services.

Flanagan Is Star.—Pat Flanagan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Flanagan of Marshfield, who is attending Columbia University is playing a star game with Columbia's football team Thursday. Columbia defeated Portland Academy by a score of nine to nothing and if its writeup of the game, the Portland Journal says: "Columbia backs were strong, Flanagan, one of Columbia's ends, was a star. He only weighs 130 pounds, but he made several good runs."

Finds Good Rock.—Mr. Kidd of the Warren Construction Company, patentees of the bitulithic paving, stated that he had found some of the best rock in the west during his trip up Coos River. He said that it was an outrage to have such country roads as there are around Marshfield when basaltic rock could be found within twelve miles of town and near a navigable stream. He indicated that his company will now enter this field for paving contracts.

Haas and Kuettner stating that the representative of the Denver bonding house, which is to furnish the bond for the project here, had just reached Portland. As soon as he goes over the situation with them, they hope to be able to push the work on the project. All other matters except the bond, they say, have been arranged.

Rasmussen today received a card from his son, Gordon Rasmussen, who entered the Oregon State Agricultural College at Corvallis this fall, stating that he was going as sub on the first team to play the Walla Walla football aggregation. He will be remembered as one of the star athletes of the Marshfield high school and getting a position as sub on the college team during his first year indicates that he is showing up mighty well there, very few making the team even as sub the first year.
