BANDON BUTTER SERVED.

Portland Commercial Club Gets

Sample of Famous Product

Wednesday's Portland Telegram says: "Ten pounds of butter, the gift of the Bandon Commercial Club, was received this morning by the Portland Commercial Club and served to members at luncheon. Beside each plate was laid a typewritten slip of paper reading as follows:

"The butter which is used on the tables today has been sent to the Portland Commercial Club by the Bandon Commercial Club. There is now being carried into Bandon from the south, within a distance of 16 miles, over half a million pounds of butter fat, nearly every pound of which finds a ready market in San Francisco, to which point it is sent by boat. Work has been commenced on a railroad running down the coast, upon which the milk will hereafter be forwarded to Bandon instead of by wagon."

"The gift was of a nature touching the right spot and occasioned favorable comment. Expressions of opinion convey the impression that when the opportunity offers the butter product of Bandon will be individually boosted by the members of the club to which the butter was sent."

CHARGES ARE DISMISSED.

Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist Passes On Two Cases.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "Palmer and Od. Endicott were taken to Coquille Tuesday to answer to a complaint made by Gus. and Paul Breuer, charging them with running a deer with a dog, and for trespass. After hearing the facts the case was dismissed by Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist. The Endicott boys said that they had shot and wounded the deer and had set the dog on it to bring it down, and the Breuer boys were not in possession of facts necessary to make their charge hold. The trespass charge was not held good by the prosecutor who held that a place must have a legal fence on four sides in order to make a trespass charge stick. It is said that the boys made it a personal matter on the occasion, but their dispute did not result in much of a fight."
