CZARINA WILL HAVE OWN DOCK

C. J. Millis Arranges For It At
'Frisco — O. C. & N.
Deal "Not Yet."

C. J. Millis, general manager of the Southern Pacific holdings on Coos Bay, returned yesterday from a business trip to San Francisco. When asked about the report that had been started during his absence to the effect that the Southern Pacific was about to take over the Oregon Coal and Navigation Company's holdings here, Mr. Millis smiled and said "not yet."

Mr. Millis made the trip down and back on the Czarina which made the round trip in just eight days, leaving here a week ago yesterday and reaching port Sunday. While in San Francisco, Mr. Millis made arrangements for a regular dock for the Czarina. She will have Dock No. 7 at the foot of Pacific street near the Ferry building and a man has been stationed there to receive and discharge freight daily. This will furnish Coos Bay the best freight service it has enjoyed between here and San Francisco for sometime, the plant having been the only regular vessel carrying freight from Frisco here before this arrangement was made.

Mr. Millis says that the coal market in San Francisco has picked up greatly and that they are scarcely able to get sufficient Beaver Hill coal there to supply the demand. The Czarina will make less than a ten days schedule between here and there for the rest of the season.

General business conditions are improving considerably in San Francisco and Mr. Millis thinks the outlook is unusually bright.
