LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"By Jove, I thought today was Saturday and I did some tall scurrying to catch the boat for Marshfield," remarked P. M. Hall-Lewis to some of his friends here yesterday. "I had some business to transact and when about half way to town, I made some remark to Captain Masters of the Curlew, about getting in to his place of business and he notified me it was Sunday. What do you think of that? A man getting so busy that he doesn't know what day of the week it is."

He was joshed to the limit about it and friends here promised to send him a calendar, an almanac or something else so that he wouldn't be like Robinson Crusoe. This was his first trip to town in a long time, his poultry ranch keeping him busy. When his friends at Hood River, where he was formerly city engineer, hear of the episode, he will be kept busy explaining.

"It is probable there will soon be established a new line of steamers from this country to the Philippines," remarked a

brought about if the line be established, by the recent action of the treasury department, which ruled that in order to enter this country duty free Philippine products will have to be shipped direct or in bond through foreign territory on their way here. For instance, the same duty would have to be paid on merchandise from Manila transshipped at Shanghai, as on merchandise coming into the United States from any foreign country. This ruling will seriously hamper the operations of the scores of foreign owned steamers that have been carrying Philippine trade from the islands to this country, by the way of foreign ports in the far east, and is bound to result in the establishment shortly of a direct line of steamers from the Philippines to America."

"The Irish Homegoing Pilgrimage in 1910 will be a great success," writes T. P. Sullivan of Boston, to natives of the Emerald Isle. "When Ireland is more prosperous ago, I found a strong sentiment in favor of the movement. The Irish Hotel-keepers' and Tourists' association is busy with schemes to insure the success of the plan. The pilgrimage will be of immense benefit to Ireland from an industrial standpoint. Evidences of prosperity in Ireland are plain on every hand. The old time mud hovels have become a curiosity and neat cottages have taken their place. Everything looked prosperous to me when I was over there. The land act is responsible for the prosperity the Emerald Isle is now experiencing. The Irish tenant can now become his own landlord on the easiest of terms and thousands have taken advantage of the opportunity. Everywhere I saw pretty little farms occupied by happy looking people and well stocked cattle. There are fine opportunities there for the American manufacturer. The Irish are making money, probably for the first time in their lives under English rule, and as their prosperity increases, so do their wants. American business men would find Ireland a good field for their trade."
