

GAME ENDS IN WRANGLE

North Bend and Marshfield
Football Teams Clash Sat-
urday—Gaffney Injured.

Saturday's football game was a disappointment to all interested in the game in this part of the county. Marshfield charges that North Bend acted so unsportsmanlike that it is doubtful if any more games will be played with it for some time. The trouble started when Strickland came out and lined up with the North Bend team in some practice work. Strickland, it is charged by Marshfield, is a professional and it was also claimed, and admitted by the North Bend team that he had started to school Friday the day before the game, while the athletic rules are that a man must enter at least a week before he will be allowed to play and that he must make a grade. Prof. F. A. Golden signed a certificate to the effect that all the members of the Marshfield football team were bona fide students, had made grades and were all eligible men but Prof. Raab of the North Bend school, refused to sign a similar certificate.

On North Bend's refusal to put Strickland out of its team, the Marshfield team protested the game and after a couple of hours of wrangling, Mr. Savage of Coquille, acting as referee called the game off.

It was finally agreed to play an exhibition game for the benefit of the crowd. On account of the lateness it was decided to play but two fifteen minute halves. This agreement was reached on the provision that Strickland be put out.

At about 4:15, the game was started, North Bend kicking to Marshfield for the first five minutes of play, the teams seemed to be about evenly matched, but Marshfield soon proved itself the stronger. Bolt and Briggs made big gains through the line while Wieder, Stutsman and Harrington made good gains around the ends. Gaffney of North Bend, was hurt and had to be carried off the field, his hip being dislocated. North Bend then tried to play Strickland. While North Bend was getting ready, Stutsman made a touchdown but the ball was taken back, the North Bend team claiming that only ten of its men were on the field, and the touchdown was not allowed. Marshfield

played good ball and after a series of lines smashes, Bolt went over for a touchdown. In about eight minutes of actual play, Marshfield had carried the ball from its twenty-five yard line, for a touchdown. Time was called. Briggs failed to kick a goal. Marshfield lined up on time for the second half, but without stating any cause, the North Bend team quit.

The Marshfield team showed fine form in the fifteen minutes of play and Coaches Hewitt and Graves are deserving of great credit. Every man on the team played his position in great style while Marshfield system of plays was superior to any ever seen here.

N. Johnson acted as referee and Heavener as umpire. R. Tower acted as head linesman.

The Marshfield team will probably leave here Friday morning for Bandon to play the high school team there.

NEWS OF COQUILLE.

County Seat Events As Told By The Sentinel.

Mayor Hawkins Wednesday purchased the five-acre tract of land just west of the strawberry ranch of Bert Seal from William F. Hewell and wife. Mr. Hawkins would not state whether or not he expected to improve his purchase at present.

The county hospital was moved Saturday from the north side to the old Little hotel building on Second street which was formerly occupied by the Anderson Business School, the school having moved to the Grant Harry building on First street.

County School Superintendent Bunch departed yesterday for Myrtle Point and Gravel Ford. His family is preparing to move to the latter place so the boys can attend school this winter and the superintendent expects to put in several days welding the hammer and saw in preparation for their coming.

Two school district petitions were submitted to the county commissioners, one from District 1 in which the boundaries are requested changed which was favorably acted upon and one from District 26 of the same nature which, owing to the great number of remonstrances received was turned down.

Nels Rasmussen passed through town yesterday on his way to his home at Bandon after a visit to San Francisco and the Portola festival. He says it was one of the finest things he ever saw in the way of a street carnival, which is rank heresy when one considers that Bandon only recently closed one of the most successful street carnivals in history.

The eight-month-old baby of E. B. Currey, the United Brethren minister living in the Myrtle Point South Methodist parsonage, met with an accident Saturday evening which might have proved very serious. The baby procured a lighted candle which happened to be in its reach and extinguished it by placing it in its right eye. The child was immediately conveyed to the city hospital where it received medical treatment, the sight now being restored, for which the parents are very thankful.

GETS DATA ON STOCK.

Government Expert Goes Over Coos County Tax Rolls.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Chas. W. Mann, the government expert who is here gathering data for the department of Agriculture, paid the county court house a visit Wednesday and among other things done he interviewed the deputy sheriff, C. A. Gage regarding the tax records for the past forty years. The particular part of his investigations centered upon the stock raising industry as represented by the tax rolls. In his investigations he went as far back as 1869 and took the statistics for each ten year period since that time. "It was his wish to secure the complete returns from this particular industry in order to ascertain for his department the exact status of this section as regard stock raising. His investigations showed that the industry has not advanced in this section as rapidly as the population and other industries have, as shown by the tax rolls. That this will be corrected as soon as adequate transportation facilities are afforded is fully sustained by the results in other localities where rail connection has been secured."
